#### TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

A new branch railroad will be built from Oxford to Durham, N. C. The road will be under control of the Durham and Northern.

The C. and O. Ry. has leased of Edward Stetson rolling stock to the amount of \$2,000,000. The lease comprises locomotives and various styles of freight cars.

The convention of the sixth Congressional district is held at Fayetteville today. Congressman Bellamy was the leading candidate but others are in the race.

Charles M. Schwab, president of the steel trust is about to retire. It is said that he will seek some remote part of the world and live there the remainder of his life. His health has broken down under the strain of his great duties.

Farmers around Lumberton, N. C. have been bothered by fruit and watermelon thieves, and put a blood hound on the track of thieves with the result of catching Ike Godwin, alias Burton. In jail Godwin confessed to the murder of a man and woman in Cumberland county.

A cable from Gen Chaffee in the Philippines to the war department at Washington says that the Moros are so troublesome that it will require a hard battle to thoroughly subdue them. He is about to organize a campaign against them which he believes, will have the desired effect.

The Sultan of Turkey is up to his old tricks by making specious promises and faithfully neglecting to fulfill them. He has roused the ire of Uncle Sam by not performing some of his agreements. The exact source of the trouble is unknown by the public, but negotiations have been under discussion for some time.

In a clash between the striking miners and the sheriff's posse at Nequehoning, Pa., Robert Sharp a miner was killed by a shot from the pistol of Harry McElroy, a deputy. Great excitement was caused by the deed and it may give rise to more lawlessness.

Wm. J. Turner, acting as counsel for the State of Alabama has sued the State of Pennsylvania for \$35,000 said to have been illegally taken by Francis Randolph Randolph was an heir of the late Commodore Corbin who was a resident of Pennsylvania.

The city of Kokuk, Ia. suffered a storm Sunday which did the most damage of any storm in its history. Telegraphic and telephonic communication was cut off, houses unroofed and the street railway property was seriously damaged.

Rev. Morgan Wood, a Congregational Minister of Cleveland, Ohio, and a well known lecturer and divine is anxious to be the Democratic candidate for Congress from his district to oppose Hon. Theodore Burton, the present incumbent and who has just at present incurred the displeasure of Hon. M. A. Hanna. The Congressional fight in that district will be the warmest that has been seen there for many years.

As the result of an old feud Jack Sheehan was fatally shot by Tom Witolds at Marion, N. C. Both parties are white.

There are rumors of Boxer uprising in China and some mission stations of the M. E. Church have been threatened.

Robert Remington, a member of New York's "400" and a prominent club man committed suicide at Newport, R. I., by shooting. He was to have been married to Miss Mary Van Allen in September. A love dispute is thought to have been the cause of the deed.

#### RALEIGH.

### Prominent Educators Expected To Change Locations.

Refused to be Taxed. State Charters Extradition From South Carolina. Asheville Excursionists Not Questions For Senator Fritchard.

RALEIGH, Aug. 19.—It is stated here on the best authority that Prof. J. B. Carlyle of Wake Forest is quite prominently mentioned for the presidency of Furman University a noted Baptist University at Greenville, S. C. The trustees are after him to succeed Dr. A. P. Montague who becomes president of Howard College Alabama. Prof Carlyle's friends say they hardly believe he will accept and that it certainly would be against his best interests to do so now that he has so engrated himself in the esteem of the people of the State.

Corporation commissioner McNeill (chairman) and S. L. Rogers went to Edenton today to hear a case in which two citizens who have considerable incomes and decline to give them in for taxation on the ground that they are non residents.

John Croton, a 14 year-old white boy, son of Joseph Croton disappeared from home Sunday and can't be found. He is believed to have left with a traveling sign painter.

An excursion of over 400 negroes came from Norfolk yesterday evening. They brought two drums and a number of costumed cake walkers and paroled the streets for some time after their arrival.

The Secretary of State charters the Southern Lumber Co., of Washington, N. C. with \$10,000 capital. The incorporators are J. W. Odlin, Frank Kugler, H. Suman and Stephen Burgaw. An application is pending on a charter to the Harris Rees Tanning Co., of Sylvia, Jackson county. The applicants for the charter are C. J. Harris, H. B. Russ and Joe J. Hooker.

Some beautiful pheasants have been donated to Pullen Park by Mr. E. H. Lee of this city.

Extradition papers have been received at Governor Aycock's office from the Governor of South Carolina for Hughral King alias Sandie King, wanted in Darlington for assault. King is said to be in Wilmington.

The Southern Railway Co.'s special train to Asheville left this morning with two well filled coaches, others are to be added enroute as passengers are taken on.

It is rumored that a prominent Republican of this city is preparing an open letter to Senator Fritchard which he will be called upon to answer at the State Convention August 28th. It is understood that it will be red hot and some of the questions and charges will be of the solar plexus kind.

#### RAINS BENEFICIAL

### For Crops Last Week. Normal Temperatures and Weather Favorable For Farm Work.

The weekly crop bulletin for week ending Monday, Aug. 18th, is as follows:

The past week was a very favorable one, and on account of beneficial rains which have wet the soil thoroughly several times, a general improvement in the condition of crops took place. The rainfall was abundant throughout the central-eastern section, occurring chiefly from the 14th to 16th, and the only region of the State still suffering from drought includes a few extreme western counties, viz: Jackson, Swain, Clay, Henderson, Buncombe and Madison. The week was characterized again by numerous severe local storms, especially in Mecklenburg, Cabarrus, and a few other counties, which resulted in considerable damage to crops by wind or hail over limited areas. The mean temperature for the week averaged about 76 degrees or nearly normal; the maximum temperatures were not excessively high, while at night the temperature has been agreeably low without checking vegetative growth. There was abundant sunshine and the weather was generally favorable for farm work; plowing stable land for wheat is beginning to make some headway; sowing turnips and fall Irish potatoes has been pushed; saving late hay and pulling fodder are underway.

Cotton continues to do well, but reports indicate that black rust has spread on cotton considerably and it is feared will injure the crop; shedding has diminished, and the plants remain full of bolls; cotton on uplands and sandy soil is opening, some prematurely perhaps, and picking has begun on a small scale. Old corn is practically made; late corn has improved very much and is very promising. Tobacco plants appear to be large and heavy in north-central portion, where cutting and curing are becoming general with fairly good results; in the south portion curing is approaching completion; in some sections tobacco is taking second growth. Peanuts and sweet potatoes are making heavy growth of vines and now promising well; clover and turkeys have come up nicely; feed crops are promising. The prospects for rice continue favorable. Grapes are ripening rapidly and are very abundant everywhere. The U. S. Department of Agriculture gave the condition of apple in North Carolina on August 16th as follows: "The crop is about 75 per cent of an average, which compares favorably with reports in other sections where reported in 1901.

#### NEGROES KILLED; TWO.

### A Fearful Affair on Sea Board Air Train Near Henderson.

RALEIGH, August 19.—Road Master Fred Stevens was killed and Jim Mitchell, colored porter mortally wounded in their efforts to protect Capt. W. P. Clements, a Seaboard Air Line conductor from the attack of four negroes.

The negroes were angry because Clements forced them out of the white coach into the Jim Crow car. The fight occurred on the passenger train which had left Henderson.

Mitchell the wounded porter was brought to Raleigh. Three negroes including Joe Cole are in jail at Henderson. The body of Stevens was also taken to Henderson.

Great excitement existed for a time and it was feared that the men would be lynched but it grew quieter.

Before the shooting Capt. Clements had ordered the men into the colored car and had passed in there himself and was collecting fares. He was followed by the negroes who, it is said, were brothers; they declared they would teach the conductor a lesson. Joe Cole struck at Capt. Clements when the colored porter intervened and the two clinched. Cole shot Mitchell in the abdomen. At this road master Stevens rushed into the car and attempted to grapple with the negro Cole when the latter sent a bullet crashing through Stevens' forehead.

Frank C. Andrews the banker wrecker who was found guilty of embezzling \$1,000,000 from the City Savings Bank at Detroit Mich. was sentenced in Recorder Court of that city to 15 years hard labor in the State prison at Jackson.
