#### Inquest Over Remains S. A. Line Victim.

Nearly a Picnic Tragedy. Political Speech Announced. Colored Firemen's Tournament. Educational Speaking. Tobacco Market Sales.

RALEIGH, Aug. 20.—A happy picnic party came near ending in a tragedy at Peony's Pond near Raleigh yesterday afternoon when Miss Emily Walker, of Raleigh was thrown into the pond by a collision of the boat with a hidden snag. She was rescued with great difficulty and in a thoroughly exhausted condition by Mr. Gordon Harris.

Chairman F. M. Simmons announces that Hon. G. W. Ward will make a political speech at Currituck court house Monday September 1st.

The physicians attending Jim Mitchell the colored train reporter dangerously wounded in efforts to quiet the disturbance on the S. A. L. southbound train yesterday afternoon, say that he has a good chance for recovery. There was no trouble what ever at Henderson last night so far as could be learned this morning. The inquest over the body of Roadmaster Stevers was held there today.

State superintendent of schools J. Y. Joyner announces a number of engagements to speak within the next two weeks.
