### GRAND JURY'S REPORT

Made at August Term, Superior Court of Craven County.

The following is the report of the Grand Jury made at the August term of the Superior Court of Craven County, to His Honor, Judge George H. Brown.

Superior Court Judge Geo. H. Brown August term, 1902. We your Grand Jury beg leave to report that we have received 57 bills of indictment and acted upon the same, finding 45 true bills and 12 not true. We have also made 10 presentments for various offenses against the law.

We have examined the County Home for the care of indigent poor and find the same cleanly and well kept with sufficient and wholesome food provided. We also commend the kindly attention of the keeper of the Home towards these poor unfortunates. One improvement we suggest for the action of the County Commissioners is the purchase of 25 small single iron beds for use in the Home to replace the present form of bedstead which we consider not of the best sanitary nature.

We have examined the County Jail and find the same well and cleanly kept, the prisoners well fed and no complaint as to food, or treatment. We also find the Jail much crowded and the addition of or completion of the iron cells as originally planned by the Commissioners much needed these additional cells are much needed in the present crowded condition of the jail for the separation of the sexes and their proper care and we urge upon the County Commissioners the erection of these additional cells. We also find one poor crazy negro who has been in prison for several years who we recommend should be placed in the asylum for better care.

We also have examined the County Court House and find the same in good condition and properly cared for.

We find the Register of Deeds' office and papers neatly and well kept and the County Records in good shape. The same report we also make in regard to Superior Courts clerk's office, also the Sheriff's office.

We find upon examination of the reports of Supervisor of Roads that the Supervisors for Township No. 1, Township No. 5, Township No. 8, and Township No. 9 have made no report of the condition of their roads in their respective townships, and from information which we believe, the condition of the Roads in No. 8 is in bad condition, and we ask the immediate attention of the Road Trustees to the condition of the Road from the Forks of the Neuse Road to Bachelor's Creek. This matter should have proper attention at once as the roads in many sections are in bad condition.

We find upon examination of the Magistrate reports an undue proportion of cases which appear to be made only for the costs to be gotten out of them. Out of a total of 75 cases reported we find by the reports six (6) cases were bound over for appearance at next term of court. 11 cases in which fines were laid amount to \$34.52, the remainder 59 cases, out of which the county gets not one penny.

We also find out of a total of \$36.33 fines laid by the Magistrates \$6.50 remain in the hands of the Magistrates not having been paid into the County Treasurer.

We find in regard to the listing of taxes the most unsatisfactory condition of affairs especially so in Township No. 8, out of a total of 2878 persons liable for taxes for year 1901. We find 496 on the delinquent list, those who failed to list as the law requires making about one in every six a delinquent.

This same condition of affairs we are happy to say does not apply to the remainder of the Townships of the county. We hope for a vigorous application of the law to bring about a better condition in the 8th Township.

### RALEIGH.

Celebrated Wilcox Case Argued Before Supreme Court.

State Charters. Strange Behavior. Oxford Orphan Asylum Improvements. Colored Firemen Tournament. Rev. W. C. Tyree Called. Lice in Cotton.

RALEIGH, Aug. 26.—The case of "Jim" Wilcox of Elizabeth City, convicted of murdering Nellie Cropsey, was argued in the Supreme Court today, E. F. Aydtlett and W. M. Bond appearing for the defense, Attorney General Gilmer representing the State.

A charter was granted today to the Harris-Rees Tanning Company of Sylva Jackson county, capital paid up \$125,000 with leave to increase to \$300,000. C. J. Harris and Hans B. Rees are the stockholders.

Among today's visitors here was Benjamin Wyche, a native of this State, now librarian of Texas.

A white man today spent many hours in the Capital Square. For a long time he kept his eyes fixed on an oak tree, then he got on his knees and prayed. He repeated this programme. Officials and police questioned him but got no answers they could understand.

Commissioner of agriculture Patterson is at Nashville, Tenn., attending the annual convention of commissioners of agriculture of the cattle growing States, of which he is president. State chemist B. W. Kilgore, the secretary of the body is also there. Mr. Patterson will be here Tuesday at the opening of the fall term of the State Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Two new buildings are under way at the Oxford Orphan Asylum, one a printing office and shoe shop, the other a laundry. A pump is being put in to take water from the new 256 foot artesian well and will give 75 gallons a minute for all purposes, including fire protection. Hydrants are being put in for use in case of fire.

The State board of inspectors of public institutions of which W. P. Wood of Asheboro is the chairman is inspecting the Soldiers' Home and hospital for the insane here, as well as the books and vouchers of the same.

It is said the 5th district republicans will endorse B. Frank Mobane for Congress.

Today the secretary of State sent the election law to the chairman of each of the county boards of election.

The thirteenth annual convention and tournament of the State colored firemen's association began here today. J. S. Plummer is the president, J. G. Latta, F. F. Chambers, vice-presidents, J. H. Edwell, treasurer, C. S. L. A. Taylor and Peter Collins, secretaries, Sylvester Dibble, marshal. The convention was called to order by president Plummer; Rev. W. M. Walters of Rocky Mount offered prayer. Mr. C. F. Lumsden of the Capital hose company made the address of welcome, to which L. R. Randolph, replied. Tomorrow the tournament begins and there will be a street parade. About twelve companies are here.

The congregation of the First Baptist church here calls Rev. W. C. Tyree of Durham to be its pastor, to succeed the late Rev. Dr. A. A. Marshall, who died 10 days ago. Rev. Mr. Tyree will accept. This is one of the leading Baptist churches in the State.

Farmers report that lice have made their appearance in some cotton fields in this section and are doing damage.

Whereas, The said Robert Hancock wrongfully and fraudulently assumed and exercised the position of Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of Craven county did pack, fraudulently and against the wishes, consent and protest of the regular delegates, the committee of credentials by placing thereof persons who were not delegates as well as those whose vote were contested. Therefore be it,

Resolved, That the Convention condemn in the severest manner the actions and conduct of the said Robert Hancock, and call upon all good Republicans and persons friendly to peace, order and good government to frown with scorn upon his conduct.

Resolved further, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the State Convention to be held in the City of Greensboro, N. C., on Thursday, August 28th, 1902.

Resolved, That we hail with pride and heartily endorse the wise policy in dealing with the domestic and foreign affairs of the Country by President Roosevelt.

Resolved, That we endorse the patriotic sentiment of Senator J. C. Pritchard.

### Married the Girl.

The Governor had declared McDonald must marry the girl or go to the penitentiary.

### To The Democratic Voters of Craven County.

The many friends of Sheriff J. W. Biddle desire to present his claims to the voters of Craven county for renomination and reelection. The county has never had a better officer; he is courteous, accommodating, faithful and in every way thoroughly competent.

When a vacancy occurred in the office of Sheriff, on account of the resignation of ex-Sheriff Kinsey, the Board of Commissioners endeavored to ascertain two things: first, who was the most competent man in the county for the office, and second, who would be most acceptable to all the voters of the county. They finally selected Sheriff Biddle as they were satisfied that he filled these two qualifications better than any other man in the county. He has only been in office a part of one term, and it would not seem right to refuse to endorse his administration the first time he comes before the people. The people are fair and just and would not intentionally dishonor any man without cause. It has been claimed that all of the candidates are from the town of New Bern except one. This is not strictly correct; three of the County Commissioners are from the county, and two years ago No. 1 Township had a most excellent candidate for Register of Deeds who would have been elected if his own township had supported him properly. Sheriff Biddle was born and raised at Fort Barn well and lived there until the war came on, when he entered the service of the Confederate States and was a most gallant and faithful soldier. The people can not do too much for the men who suffered and fought for the South during the war. Of all the candidates upon the ticket Mr. Biddle is the only representative of the soldier vote. It is true a man ought not to be selected to fill an office because he was a brave soldier, but when he is in every way competent, the people ought not to forget such services as these. While Mr. Biddle lives in New Bern, he was born and raised in the country and still owns the lands where his father lived before him.

We do not wish to disparage any other candidate, as all the candidates for office in this County are good and true men, whose past services to the Democratic party merit recognition and entitle them to aspire to any office in the County. But we do say that we do not wish to cast any reflection upon Sheriff Biddle by refusing to elect him when he has only served a part of one term. We have never heard of an instance where a good man capable and competent, who had been appointed to the office of Sheriff had not received the nomination at the hands of his party at the succeeding Convention.

In submitting the claims of Sheriff Biddle to the people of Craven county we are only actuated by a desire to see justice done to a good officer, and we have every confidence that the people of Craven county will treat Sheriff Biddle fairly, and will accord him a nomination at the coming Primaries.
