### LABOR DAY QUIET.

Important State Charters Lumber and Cotton Companies.

New Rain Is Wanted. Populist Convention. Large Number Murder Cases. Bad Outlook Next Winter For Small Pox.

RALEIGH, Sept. 1.—Today, as Labor Day, was only observed here by the closing of public buildings and the display of National and State flags. There was no parade or speech-making. The various local labor organizations are saving their money for the building of a "labor temple."

Gov. Aycock returned yesterday afternoon from the mountains. In company with Mr. George N. Canis of Baltimore he made a delightful carriage trip from Columbus, Polk county, to Chimney Rock and other points of interest in the Hickory Nut Gap.

Commissioner of agriculture Patterson returned today from Nashville, Tenn.

Rain is now urgently needed in this section. All crops save sweet potatoes show signs of suffering. Cotton is very brown, is losing leaves and opening too rapidly. Rust on it is very bad.

There has been less typhoid fever here so far this year, than ever before—only 8 cases all the summer and not a death of a city resident.

It is now certain that the Populists have decided to hold a State convention.

At Wilson this week six murder cases are on the docket. James H. Pou of this city appears in three of the cases—nearly all the defendants are white.

Dr. James R. Rogers, who for two months was sick, has returned here well. He is the physician to the A. & M. College, which will open Wednesday.

Secretary R. H. Lewis of the State board of health has sent a small pox report to Wadesboro to investigate a report as to that disease there. Dr. Lewis says small pox is widely scattered in the State and unless there is vaccination it will be bad next winter.

### To The Democratic Voters of Craven County.

The many friends of Sheriff J. W. Biddle desire to present his claims to the voters of Craven county for re-nomination and reelection. The county has never had a better officer; he is courteous, accommodating, faithful and in every way thoroughly competent.

When a vacancy occurred in the office of Sheriff, on account of the resignation of ex-Sheriff Kinsey, the Board of Commissioners endeavored to ascertain two things: first, who was the most competent man in the county for the office, and second, who would be most acceptable to all the voters of the county. They finally selected Sheriff Biddle as they were satisfied that he filled these two qualifications better than any other man in the county. We do not wish to disparage any other candidate, as all the candidates for office in this County are good and true men, whose past services to the Democratic party merit recognition and entitle them to aspire to any office in the County. But we do say that we do not wish to cast any reflection upon Sheriff Biddle by refusing to elect him when he has only served a part of one term. We have never heard of an instance where a good man capable and competent, who had been appointed to the office of Sheriff had not received the nomination at the hands of his party at the succeeding Convention.
