### TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

About 300 miners at the Coal Creek Company's colliery, in Tennessee, have gone on a strike over a wage scale.

Frosts were reported Wednesday night in northwestern Nebraska, western Iowa and parts of South Dakota.

An electric car was smashed, yesterday, at San Francisco, Cal., by a Southern Pacific train and six persons hurt.

Murder in the second degree is the verdict against Beale Hickland, who killed Allen Bailey, 19 years old, at Olathe, Kan.

A lone highwayman held up the Walnut Grove stage near Courtland, Cal., yesterday, and robbed the driver and passengers.

President Roosevelt has accepted an invitation to review the Grand Army parade in Washington, D. C., with Commander-in-Chief Torrance.

The settlement of the licensed tug-men's strike on the Great Lakes is unsatisfactory to the men at Buffalo, N. Y., and they refuse to work.

President Roosevelt has started on his Southern trip. There is but little evidence of his miraculous escape from death visible in his face.

Hon. Horace Botes, will probably be the choice for Governor of the Democratic convention in Iowa.

Carrie Nation says she has abandoned smashing saloons. "All saloon men are not bad," she said, "and there are lots worse who pose as pillars in the churches."

An investigation of the Presbyterian Hospital at Chicago, Ill., was started yesterday because of complaints of criminal carelessness in the institution.

The United States steamer Hawk will be returned to the Government owing to a dispute between the Ohio naval reserves of Toledo and Cleveland.

### Fatal Floods in Japan.

VIctoria, B. C., Sept. 5.—Tokio journals received by mail here state that floods have caused heavy loss of life and property in some of the districts of Japan.

In Hiroshima 70 persons lost their lives and 30 were injured, while many houses were washed away and vessels were wrecked. In Yamaguchi 78 were drowned, and 13 crushed to death, 11 washed away with their houses and 17 injured. Several thousand houses were inundated.

In Siam province 24 persons were drowned and four crushed to death.

### Oil For Steamships.

Washington, Sept. 5.—The report of Lieutenant Ward Mitchell, U. S. N., the expert detailed by the Navy Department to observe the installation and efficiency of the oil fuel system as fitted to the Oceanic Steamship Company's steamer Mariposa, has been received at the Navy Department. The report contains matter of great value to the shipping and naval world. The report says the Mariposa's gross displacement was 2,350 tons and her average horse power with oil about 2,421, giving her a daily average of 354 knots and a mean speed of 13.58 with 278 barrels of oil per day. This was 60 per cent. less in weight than would be required of coal for one and a half pounds of oil sufficed to produce a horse power. An advantage in the oil fuel was the reduction of engine room force from 96 to 30 men. All of the burners were not used except at short intervals.

### Fire in Ship Burned a Month.

Victoria, B. C., September 5.—For 30 days, during her trip from London to Adelaide, Australia, the cargo of the Italian ship Pasquale Larro was on fire.

It started in the beginning of July and it was not until the end of that month that the vessel reached her destination. The hatchmen had to be fastened down and for fear of spreading the fire the ship had to be kept under sealed sails.

The provisions were destroyed and the feet of the members of the crew were scorched when they walked the decks.

### RALEIGH.

#### Big Rush Of Leaf Tobacco Into Market.

State Charter. Republicans Talk of Carrying North Carolina. Injured by an Explosion. Officers A. & M. College Cadet Battalion.

RALEIGH, Sept. 6.—Governor Aycock went to Lexington today and made a speech at a public school rally and flag presentation and raising.

The State charters the Allen K. Smith Company of Smithfield, giving it power to construct tobacco prize houses, warehouses and factories, and also to build and operate a general warehouse for tobacco.

There was never such a leaf tobacco trade as there is this season. East of here there is a rush. It is said that in some markets the farmers do not even sort their leaf, but are so well pleased with the high prices that they put it on the floors just as it is. The result is that the buyers make big money, as they sort it with special care.

Attorney General R. D. Gilmer has gone to Washington, N. C., on business connected with the State's swamp lands, and will also look after some matters connected with oysters.

J. C. L. Harris is employed by South Dakota as counsel and will take depositions here before Ed. S. Battle who is appointed commissioner. Harris will act in conjunction with Ex-Gov. Russell who represents private parties to the suit.

The 138th volume of Supreme Court reports is being sent out by the Secretary of State.

Some of the Republicans are very sanguine as to carrying the State this year. Of such mind are revenue collector Duncan and W. H. Day. On what ground they base their calculations no outsider can imagine. Certainly they do not appear to have a ghost of a chance.

One of the assistant State chemists came near being seriously hurt yesterday afternoon by an explosion. A substance, claimed to be pure linseed oil, was sent to the State chemist for analysis. The test was with nitric acid. This was poured in and the explosion followed. The stuff was found to be gasoline and rosin, and really in appearance is a capital imitation of linseed oil.

Miss Carrie E. Broughton, daughter of Mr. N. B. Broughton of Raleigh, is appointed assistant State librarian, vice M. De L. Haywood, resigned.
