Oil For Steamships.

Washington, Sept. 5,-The report of Lieutenant Ward Mitchell, U. S. N., the expert detailed by the Navy Department to observe the installation and efficiency of the oil fuel system as fitted to the Oceanic Steamahlp Company's steamer Mariposa, has been received at the Navy Department. The report contains matter of great value to the shipping and naval world. The report says the Mariposa's world. The report says the Mariposa's gross dispisosment was \$,160 tons and her average horse power with oil about \$,461, giving her a daily average of \$54 knots and a mean speed of 18,58 with \$78 barrels of oil per day. This was 50 per cent, less in weight than would be required of coal for one and a half pounds of oil sufficed to produce a horse power. An advantage is the oil fast power. 
