RALEIGH

Crops Show Great Improvement During Past Month.

State Charter. Mixed Political Sentiment. Reward For Murderer. Timber Land Case. Baptists Increasing in Number. School Enrollment.

RALEIGH, Oct. 14.—A charter was granted by the State today to the Cape Fear Rice Company, which will operate a rice mill at Wilmington. The capital stock is \$200,000, and the stockholders are E. Burton Anderson, John H. Goro and Jas. W. Sweden.

The Supreme Court today took up the 6th district appeal docket. Among the attorneys here are J. G. Shaw, G. M. Rose, H. L. Cook, Fayetteville; J. A. Lockhart, H. H. McLendon, Wadesboro; J. W. Keenan, Charlotte; N. A. McLean, Lumberton; L. D. Robinson, John T. Bennett, Wadesboro; N. J. Adams, Carthage; John D. Shaw, Jr., Laurinburg.

Politics appears to be mixed. In most sections there is apathy, but in some there is interest. For example John A. Lockhart said today: "There is no political interest in our section, people are attending to business;" while W. J. Adams said, "There is nothing but politics in my county."

The prediction is made by some Democrats that the party will carry all the counties save 10, and will make gains in these.

The murderer Frank With of Wayne county, who was trilled and captured by his nephew was taken at Fayetteville. There is a \$250 reward and part of this is an amateur detective claim. The detective had another motive also, for the man murdered was his brother. A lawyer was here yesterday to see about the claim for part of the reward.

It is not denied now that the crops in this State are much better than was expected 30 days ago. The farmers are in good spirits and have recovered from the worries due to the crop failure last year.

Judge Farnell heard argument here in the case of Trencard & Co. vs. Kell & Co. involving \$40,000 of timber lands and other properties in Northampton county.

A report on the white Baptists in this State shows they number 173,000. There are now 87 associations. One is a new one. It is the Wilmington association. This denomination is now doing a great missionary work in the North Carolina mountain region.

The number of white pupils enrolled in the public schools of the State is now 223,000; a marked increase over that last year.

Bud Foster, colored, who murdered a white man named Johnson near Louisville and was for weeks kept in jail here to prevent lynching, was today put on trial at Louisville.

The State charters the Norfolk & Carolina Telegraph and Telephone Co., with headquarters at Elizabeth City, capital two hundred thousand dollars. It is owned by Portsmouth and Elizabeth City people.
