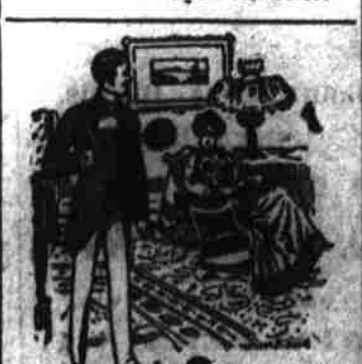

INTO GREENSBORO

The Seaboard Air Line Will Soon Enter.

Rural Graded School Progress. Football. State Institutions For Blind. Bigamy Case at Soldiers Home. State Fair.

RALEIGH, Oct. 19.—The State Superintendent of public instruction was greatly pleased today at the receipt of a letter from Franklin county, saying that rural graded schools were being established and school districts consolidated, and that in several cases the people had raised money for school houses the school board giving a like amount. He is delighted at the awakened interest and the progress made.

It is said by the officers of the State Fair that if the weather is good the attendance will be 20 per cent greater than ever before.

The assertion is made by some persons who have traveled considerably in the State lately, that Lee S. Overman is well in the lead for the Senatorship with Cyrus R. Watson, second.

The football team of the Agricultural and Mechanical College today played the Virginia Polytechnic Institute. It next plays St. Albans, and it may play Columbia, at Washington. The average weight of the team's members is 160 lbs. It is quite a heavy one.

The Republican State committee met today at Greensboro, Senator Pritchard presiding.

The State board of examiners of public institutions devoted today to the State school for the blind here. There are 39 State institutions, maintained wholly by the State or receiving aid from it, not counting the agricultural department. By the 15th of November the board is required to make its report. It will be ready in time. This board will take a great deal of work off the legislature, the committees of which have visited the various institutions in a perfunctory way.

One of the inmates of the Soldiers Home here was dismissed today, for bigamy. His name is John Cotton, and he is from Wayne. He had a wife in that county and one in Wake. He denied the Wayne wife yesterday, but today admitted her existence. She is Nancy Cotton and she wrote here and asked about her husband. Cotton says he married a woman named Shores, near Raleigh. They have a child. He said he did not know what the Wayne people would do to him when he went back there. He also ruined the wife of a man who lives near the home. He left the home this morning.

The oldest inmate of the Soldiers Home is George W. Beeman of this county. He was in the 47th regiment. His age is 94. He had also four sons in the army.

It is now certain that there will be a large attendance at the State convention of county superintendents of education here November 13-14. Overcoats for the cadets of the Agricultural and Mechanical College are ordered. A special request for 160 more rifles for the cadet battalion was made today. It has now only 300 rifles. The corps will all be uniformed by next week, so as to parade at the fair, and for this purpose the additional arms are desired.

The Raleigh & Western R. R. which is being quite rapidly constructed from Osnunock to Greensboro, will give the Seaboard Air Line a long desired entrance into Greensboro. The road is now in operation from Osnunock to the S. A. L. to Osnunock, 8 miles, and 18 miles more are already graded. The total length of the road is 160 miles. It will traverse a country containing valuable timber, and there are 18 cotton mills along the line. The grades will be easy, not over 15. President Henshaw tells your correspondent.

Market Letter on Cotton.

New York, Oct. 18.—The question during the coming week will be one of receipts and not of weather. This a. m. market opened weak and though the tone was weak, considerable resistance was noticeable. May and March ruled around 8.38 without much trade till the Houston estimate for Monday was made. This started a few nervous shorts to cover in short order. This is the first time this season that receipts have swayed the market, for that reason we are inclined to think they will out more figure than the weather reports during the coming week. Last year we had the large figures of something like 670,000 or 680,000. We will do well to get 600,000 bales this year. We don't see where the big receipts are coming from—without a big port movement we can't have a big total in sight. We would call attention to the movement this and next week and as long as figures fall from 100,000 to 300,000 bales behind last year's figures each day as they did today, we would buy cotton on any and every break for a steady market.

A New Sport For Women.

"Hammering" is an unpleasant process on the Stock Exchange, but in Australia the word has recently acquired a new and more agreeable significance. At antipodean bazars "hammering" is now an established institution. Ladies who enter for the competition go on a platform with hammers in their hands. Each is supplied with a piece of the hard Australian timber largely used for the paving of London streets. Each lady is also presented with three nails, and at a given signal they start to work. The lady who is the first to drive her three nails home to the head wins the prize. Says one descriptive reporter: "Steel sparks and splinters flew around. The nails would go anywhere but through the wood. The hammers would go anywhere—but on the nail heads."—London Chronicle.

The Ocean Trip.

Half an hour or so appears to be an important saving in time in the ocean voyage. Columbus and Cabot and Drake would not have thought much of it, but in these days of ship speeding every captain of a liner is ambitious to maintain his record and to beat it if possible. Again, there are people even in this age of hurry and bustle, to whom the ocean trip is in itself an agreeable incident. The society is generally pleasant, there are interesting sights on the deep, the fare is as good as that of a first class hotel, sensibility has become unfashionable, there is plenty of reading matter and no disposition to look at it, and the trip is in short a restful loaf till the ship is within range of the wireless telegraph and the meddling world resumes its chatter.—Brooklyn Eagle.

An Ingenious Swindle.

A novel kind of swindle was practiced in a German town the other day. A man trudging along under a heavy burden suddenly stumbled and crashed through a plate glass store window. The proprietor of the store demanded payment. The porter said he had no money. Passerby advised that he be searched. A thousand mark note was found on him, which, he said, belonged to his employer. The storekeeper, however, deducted 100 marks for the value of his window and handed 900 marks change to the porter, who went away swearing and protesting. A little later the storekeeper discovered the thousand mark note was spurious.
