SOIL SURVEY MAPS.

A Great Task for the Commissioner of Agriculture.

Report of Examiners of State Institutions Made. The A & M Farm a Splendid Investment. Many Lawyers Arguing Cases Before the Supreme Court.

RALEIGH, December 9.—The State today chartered the Oronally Ceramic Company of Oronally, capital \$20,000, William Gilchrist and others stockholders. It will manufacture ceramics, terra cotta, tiles, brick, etc.

The corporation commission is informed that the Oxford and Coast Line railway will be completed and in operation January 1. It is a road only 4 miles in length, connecting Oxford with the Seaboard Air-Line, the purpose being to give the latter system an entrance into Oxford.

Many attorneys are in attendance on the Supreme Court, among them being J. Frank Ray of Macon county; Walter Moore of Webster; H. G. Connor of Wilson; E. K. Bryan and Robert Burk of Wilmington; George F. Eason, of Charlotte.

The temperature fell to 36 here this morning. There was plenty of ice and at last the rose-blooms were killed. There is not much coal here but a bountiful supply of wood, and thanks to the good roads the prices of wood are not increased. In fact wood is cheaper than in many of the near-by places.

It will require two or three years to complete the soil survey maps based on the surveys already completed in this State. The survey has been completed or partially completed in about 25 counties. It has cost the agricultural department something like \$15,000. It is a great and valuable work. For every dollar the department has expended upon it the United States has expended another dollar. A strip along the railroads between here and Morehead City is surveyed and mapped. Much of the work westward, between here and Asheville is done and some maps made.

The report of the board of examiners of State institutions was today printed and sent to the Governor. It makes a 100 page pamphlet. The summary of its contents has long ago been given to the public. In some respects it is a valuable report, and will give the legislature much valuable material. In some respects it is crude and hasty.

Excellent progress has been made in the preparation of the farm lands lately bought by the Agricultural and Mechanical College here. Many students have been at work on the large farm since August. It is now the desire to have what may be termed a separate plant or set of buildings for the agricultural department of the college, leaving the present one for the mechanical department.

Mrs. Marion Neakitt Kendrick, wife of Capt. W. B. Kendrick, died at her home here last night. She was a native of Georgia.

Mr. Joseph John Jackson, the oldest resident of Pittsboro, is dead, at the age of 85. He was a graduate of the State University and practiced law many years. Three years ago he and his wife celebrated their golden wedding.

A Proclamation by the Governor \$100 Reward!

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, Executive Department.

Whereas, official information has been received at this department that Cyrus Dixon has escaped from jail, being under sentence of death for murder, and Whereas, it appears that the said Cyrus Dixon has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him:

Now, Therefore, I, Charles B. Aycock, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this my Proclamation, offering a Reward of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) has heretofore been offered making total of \$400 for the apprehension and delivery of the said Cyrus Dixon to the Sheriff of Jones County at the Court-house in Trenton and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.

Done at our City of Raleigh, the 3rd day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and two, and in the one hundred and twenty-seventh year of our American Independence.
