Weather Temperatures in South.

Washington, December 27.--Temperatures have continued to fall in the South, the line of freezing extending to the Georgia and almost to the middle coast. They continue low to the north and westward and are 4 to 29 degrees below seasonal average. Low temperature will continue Saturday east of the Mississippi. It will be warmer tomorrow in upper lake regions and Gulf States. Warnings of frosts and freezing temperatures have been issued to the Gulf States and North Florida. Freezing temperature extends as far as central portion of the cotton belt.
