### TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

The town of Olyphant, a mining town in Pennsylvania, which is largely built over a coal mine is wrecked on account of the earth caving in and precipitating the buildings into the mine. The damage will reach many thousands of dollars. So far as known no lives were lost.

Gov. Odell was inaugurated Governor of New York, Thursday.

There is an agitation in favor of negro colonization of the Philippine Islands.

The first message over the new Pacific cable was received at San Francisco from Honolulu, Hawaiian Islands, Thursday.

Foreigners are leaving Tetuan, Morocco, as their safety is endangered by the rebels who now seem to be waging victorious warfare.

### January-March Forum.

The reviews of the last quarter's progress which constitute the main section of the January-March number of the Forum cover, as usual, the leading departments of public activity, especially in the United States. The most prominent place is given to Henry Litchfield West's review of "American Politics," including, of course, the Congressional elections, and this paper is closely followed by a similar account of "Foreign Affairs" from the pen of A. Maurice Low. Of no less importance is the description by Alexander D. Noyes of the quarter's movements in "Finance," concluded as it is by a careful estimate of future probabilities. Olan H. Lang writes on "The Educational Outlook," and the editor, Dr. J. M. Rice, sets forth under the heading of "Educational Research" the conclusions to be drawn from his own investigations, previously recorded, into the causes of success and failure in the teaching of arithmetic in public schools. The present issue is completed on "Waterways, an Economic Necessity," by Prof. Lewis M. Haupt and on "The Passing of the American Indian," by Thomas F. Millard.

A citizen of Dublin, Ga.—Christian Scientist, refused to give medicine to his sick child. The child died and the father was arrested and fined \$500. The case was appealed to the state supreme court, which today reversed the judgment of the lower court, holding that failure to give medical attendance to children when ill is not a violation of the laws of the state.

## SENATORIAL CONTEST

New the Sensation in Capitol City.

Members of Legislature Arriving. The Fries Merger. Complaints on Text Books. Educational Notes.

RALPHIGH, January 3.—The senatorial contest is now getting warm. Today Locke Craig of Asheville, one of the aspirants, arrived, as did also his campaign manager, Senator Webb. Cyrus B. Watson of Winston, is also here, and his campaign manager is John M. Wilson of Greensboro. Mr. Wilson, when asked what were Watson's prospects, replied, "His chances are the best, I think, but I am not giving out any figures."

A few more members of the legislature arrived today, among them P. W. McMillan of Elizabeth City and Ray of Mecon.

Among other arrivals today were W. D. Pruden, of Edenton; E. F. Aydtell of Elizabeth City; R. A. Dye, Fayetteville; E. K. Bryan, G. M. Britt, Wilmington; James A. Bryan, New Bern; A. C. Zollcoffer, Henderson.

There are two sides to the matter of the Fries merger of cotton mills. A representative of Mr. Fries says it will be effected.

Today the State text book commission met in the office of the State Superintendent, to take up complaints which have come in from 40 counties. Some of the complaints are urgent. There were present representatives of all the book companies which have the contracts for furnishing text books. Among those present was Maj. C. L. Patton, of New York.

The machinery in the textile building at the Agricultural and Mechanical College here will all be in operation by early spring. Some is now in operation. It is power which is needed.

Not long ago State Auditor Dixon made a speech on education in a district in Robeson county. That county today voted a special local tax for schools. In another district in that county the plan failed by six votes, this being due to the fact that voters stayed away from the polls.

### Market Letter on Cotton.

By private wire, J. E. Latham & Co.

New York, January 3.—Following the advance of the week, there was the inevitable Saturday realizing. Holders who had good profits took them and selling was more than enough to supply the market wants. Liverpool advanced at opening about 5 points and then losing about all in a way discouraging some of the trade here at opening. Selling abroad was due to profit taking and here to same cause. Then too, Houston for Monday looked up about twice as many as last year. A large quantity of cotton appears around 8c and January and March ran along rather close most of the time. Spot sales in the South were very heavy yesterday at full prices, and as long as the demand continues in face of a light movement, it will be safe to buy on all recessions. There is likely to be a break again Monday. Prices have been cleaned rapidly and the market may be reached of the short interest. On a good break of 10 or 20 points we would begin to buy, for the break can hardly amount to much. Receipts are not on a scale to re-assure spinners in a day. It will take a large movement for some weeks to change sentiment. Don't believe in the small crop estimates and look for increased estimates later. Sentiment is now bullish. Amount in sight for week was 20,000 bales behind last year and excess over last year is now only 78,000 bales. This is not enough to encourage eleven million bale estimate, and without such, prices are more likely to go higher. Until the movement is such as to turn sentiment we believe in holding to the bull side.

## Notice to Merchants

(Schedule B, Revenue Act 1901.)

Office Register Deeds, Craven Co., New Bern, N. C., Jan. 1, 1903. You are required by law to deliver or return to me, within ten days after the first day of January, in each year, a sworn statement of the amount of gross sales made by you in your business as a vendor of, or dealer in goods, wares, merchandise, commodities of whatsoever kind or nature, either wholesale or retail for the twelve months, or any part of said time, preceding the first day of January, 1903.

Prompt compliance with the law is earnestly requested, and for failure to do so you will be required to come before the Board of County Commissioners, and further be guilty of a misdemeanor.
