Jan. 13.—Cold, cold is the weather, business all suspended, everybody cutting wood and making a fire.

The steamer Howard took on a heavy load of cotton seed here this morning from the gin house of Mr. Harnett.

Very little cotton in the country now. Some few lots held by parties. No big ones such as was the case last year.

There was an early marriage solemnized at the residence of Mr. Reuben N. White yesterday morning about 8 o'clock. The contracting parties were Mr. A. L. Camer to Miss Ida Wooten.

Cotton sold at this place last Saturday for 8.60. We have the best cotton market in Jones county, of any in the State, everything considered.

Mr. W. J. Hall has moved to this place and is now prepared to do draying, hauling, plowing and anything needed of an all around man.

Mr. Josiah M. Henderson an old resident of this county, who left here some years ago for Charleston, S. C. to engage in the trucking business, has had great success financially and has moved back to his residence in this place, he has a nice farm near here. We are glad to welcome Mr. Henderson and family back among us again.

Mr. Wm. B. Blades is putting in a rail road just up the road here outside of the corporate limits, which will be extended on as the timber is cut, over in and through Onslow county, via Richlands, etc.

There are four or five old bachelors at this place who can't understand why it is that everybody but themselves have no trouble in getting married.

Mr. E. B. Elliott and Mr. Silas Beaman have formed a co-partnership in the culture of tobacco, they are now preparing their land, cutting logs and planting tobacco beds. Mr. Beaman is an experienced and practical tobacco man.

There is a case of small pox at the 10 mile place in the family of Frank Dudley, colored, which is thought to have been carried there by his dog from the Phillips' near there dogs, cats and fowls are said to be great conductors of the germ—they should be looked after very carefully, as well as people who have been in contact with the disease.

Mr. John A. Robinson living near here has 8 or 10 six months old pigs which he will kill next week that will weigh from 100 to 175 lbs each. This proves what can be done by improving and attending to stock properly. Mr. Robinson is a very successful farmer all around.

Mr. C. E. Holland, of Swamboro, keeps this market supplied with fish and oysters, but for him we would have but few. He had some very large fat oysters here last Saturday which sold readily at 80 cents per gallon.

WHO WILL QUIT

Most Important Subject in Senatorial Contest.

Revenue Bill To Be Discussed. Senatorial Sermons C. B. Denson. Monday a Holiday. State Guard Conventions. Watts Liquor Bill.

RALEIGH, Jan. 16.—The Finance Committee of the Senate and of the House met in joint session last evening and appointed a sub-committee to which is submitted the work of preparing the Revenue Bill and Machinery Act, or rather to make any necessary changes in the present law. Senator Denson of the committee says very many changes will be made. The Treasurer, Auditor and Chairman of the Corporation and Tax Commission were before the committee and stated frankly that the present Revenue and Machinery Act are the best the State has ever had. Governor Aycock so declared in his message to the legislature. The sub-committee will hold meetings nightly, beginning next Monday night for the special purpose of hearing complaints or suggestions from business men, manufacturers and other interests. Senator Denson says the purpose is to have the bill prepared, ready for submission quite early in the session and not wait as heretofore until late to consider this most important measure.

Nine tenths of the talk about the Senatorial contest today was as to whether the Craig forces would stick, or whether their strength would be thrown to Overman or Watson. The Craig men have all along claimed that they could never be induced to waver and they have been remarkably solid. There are people who have all along contended that there would be no nomination until Monday night which is the last before the balloting is to begin in open season, of course as has been said before there is politics within politics in this Senatorial contest and the Governorship, is the real storm center of the situation. Hence there have been persons, who have hinted that in a crisis the Overman people might throw their strength for Craig and thus deeply gratify certain interests which have been loyal to Overman all along.

The funeral services over the remains of Capt. Claude B. Denson, were held at Christ Church this afternoon at one o'clock. Many of the State officials and members of the Legislature, teachers and former pupils of the Raleigh Male Academy and the Pittsboro Academy were present, while L. O. B. Branch Camp Confederate Veterans was the special escort. The remains were taken to Pittsboro on a special train and were buried there. A large number of Raleigh people accompanied the remains to Pittsboro. Capt. Denson was greatly esteemed, a man of noble impulse, a true soldier and citizen, a ripe scholar and a man whose life had for forty-two years been devoted to the State of his adoption.

Next Monday is Lee's birthday, a State holiday, and the Legislature will adjourn as a mark of respect. The Daughters of the Confederacy and the Confederate Veterans will have special exercises and there will also be exercises at the Soldiers' Home.

There is a bill before the House providing that in case either party breaks a contract for farm labor before the crop is made he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

A large delegation of Durham people were here today to appear before the committee on Railroads in support of the bill introduced by representative Fuller of Durham to force the railways, four of which will enter that town to build a union passenger station. Adjutant General Royster will by Monday issue the call for the convention of State Guard officers here to make arrangements to meet the requirements of the Dick National Guard Bill. This bill which will be a law as soon as signed by the President will put the National Guard of this State on a perfect footing, give it emplacements, and complete instruction annually, re-arm it with magazine rifles, and give it virtually everything that the regular army has, making it part of a homogeneous force back of the regulars. It is felt by the officers in this State that it is the greatest step ever taken for the improvement of the force, as under its provisions a very large sum will be available and everything will be done to make it thorough and effective.

Last Wednesday and Thursday there will be special hearings before the committee of the lower House on the Watts bill regulating the sale and manufacture of liquor. This is by far the most important liquor bill ever introduced in the Legislature in this State and it is so clear that it was drafted by Senator Stephens and Governor Aycock, after the most careful consideration and collaboration.
