## UNDECIDED YET.

Expected Decision of Senatorship Does Not Come.

Watson Leads by Eleven Votes. Carr in Again. Next Caucus Tuesday Night.

RALEIGH, Jan. 23.—The Democratic caucus resumed its balloting for a United Senator tonight. The first ballot resulted as follows—Watson 60, Overman 56, Craig 23.  
The second ballot tonight was as follows—Watson 61, Overman 56, Craig 20.  
The third ballot resulted: Watson 61, Overman 54, Craig 21.  
The fourth ballot was: Watson 60, Overman 57, Craig 13, Carr 2.  
The fifth ballot was: Watson 63, Overman 56, Craig 17, Carr 5, Glenn 1.  
The sixth ballot was, Watson 63, Overman 53, Craig 18, Carr 4.  
The seventh ballot tonight, and the fifty third, since the caucus first met, resulted, Watson 65, Overman 54, Craig 17 Carr 2. The caucus then adjourned until 8 o'clock Tuesday night.  
Up to this afternoon the Watson forces expected a break in the Overman ranks and also among the followers of Craig, but since then the scenes are being shifted. The Overman and Watson forces are afraid of each other, and also of the result of a break in Craig's forces and are interested in keeping the latter together until they can try to make some new arrangements.

### LEGISLATION AGAINST LIQUOR.

New Tax Bills. Liquor Dealers Want no Changes. Change of Courts. Out of Date Method.  
RALEIGH, January 23.—The State Association of city public school superintendents met here this morning at the Centennial public school. The attendance is good.  
Governor Aycock consents to an exchange of courts by which Judge Neal will hold the February criminal term of Mecklenburg, while Judge Shaw will hold the February criminal term of Forsythe.

All the talk today, among politicians was about the Senatorial situation. Watson last night was absolutely sure he would win tonight. Craig's manager, Webb, said this morning: "I am tired of this business and want to end it."

Today the commissioner of labor and printing was before the legislative committee on printing, and said the journals and the bills could be and ought to be printed and that the reason why the printers said this could not be done was that they would get only one price for that work, instead of being allowed to charge twice for it. He says the State's methods of handling the bills and journals is 100 years behind the times.

A delegation of liquor dealers from Wilmington is here, to work against the London bill and other bills regulating the liquor traffic. J. G. L. Gieschen, one of the delegation, said all that was desired was that the law should stand as it is. It is certain that there will be prohibition of manufacture and sale in a number of counties. Already there is such prohibition in 28 of them.

The hotel keepers' association had a hearing on the bill before the Legislature making hotels liable for guests baggage, money, jewelry, etc., to as large an amount as \$1,000. They are fighting the bill.

Richard N. Hackett is indicating the vote of the present Legislature.

There is a bill before the house to amend the merchants purchase tax law by making the tax 50 cents on each thousand dollars. There is also a bill to tax whisky and brandy 10 cents a gallon, wine 5 cents, beer 3 cents; the tax to be on the person who buys for the purpose of selling, whether he be principal or agent or buys through a commission merchant.

There is a plan to merge the London and the Watts bills regulating the liquor traffic and manufacture. The liquor men are not bitter against the Watts bill. They are against the London bill. The hearings will occur next Wednesday and Thursday.

The act of enforcing the State opiate law for 1901-02, found to be \$10,000 while the revenue from the tax on opiate, etc. for those years was \$40,474.

## YESTERDAY'S LEGISLATURE

Bills for Special Tax Levy. To incorporate Banks. Prohibit Sale of Pistols and Air Guns. Usual Senatorial Vote.

RALEIGH, Jan. 23.—In the Senate bills were introduced prohibiting hunting in Robeson County; amending State constitution so either race may impose special school tax for its exclusive use in any district; to submit question of dispensary in Tarboro; to the popular vote.

Among bills passed were: establishing a graded school at Greenville incorporating Merchants and Farmers bank of Wintons; incorporating Carnegie public library at Charlotte.  
In the House bills were introduced to make counties liable for tort; to incorporate State Auditors' Society for protection of birds; abolishing customs of filing Bible and taking oath; to incorporate bank of Hamble.

Bills passed this reading conferring on Corporation Commission power to compel railroads to build Union depots where two or more roads enter a town; bill to prohibit the sale of five crackers over two inches long, and toy pistols passed second reading, but went over for amendment, including air guns.

In the joint session of Senate and House to elect a United States Senator was held as usual without result, complimentary votes being shown on several notes of democracy.
