### JUST A GUESS.

**Senatorial Result in Its Final Outcome.**  
To Protect Birds. Wreck on R. & C. F. Railroad. Beane's Island Celebration. 30 Years Sentence. To Tax Non-Resident Gunners.  
RALEIGH, January 24.—The Senatorial situation is yet a puzzle. Craig still holds the balance of power. It was said last night that had his forces all abandoned him Overman would have won by two votes. The margin is too narrow to be comfortable. Most people are surprised at the long draw-out contest.  
Watson's policy is that of attrition—the wearing away gradually of the Craig forces, so as to make small gains nightly and not risk the absolute dissolution of the Craig forces all at once.  
There was a meeting of the legislative committee on corporations to hear arguments in support of the bill to charter the North Carolina Audubon Society, for the protection of birds. It is a valuable measure, a true labor of love. Strong speeches in support of it were made by Gilbert Pearson of Greensboro and A. H. Boyden of Salisbury, and the sentiment is unanimously in favor of it.  
There was a wreck last night on the Raleigh and Cape Fear railway, at or near McCuller's station. The train parted and the rear part dashed into the front. A passenger car was wrecked and Mrs. Rogers, wife of the agent here, was hurt.  
Mrs. Blair of Raleigh today addressed on temperance, the State Association of superintendents of city schools in session here. The Association ended its session today. Twenty three cities and towns were represented.  
A local delegation from Dare county was here today to confer with the general committee on the Roanoke Island celebration. There was a conference this morning and another one this evening.  
Rod Foster, the negro who was kept in jail here nearly two years for safekeeping and who was last Monday taken to Louisiana, for trial the third time for the murder of Forney Johnson, was yesterday convicted and given a 30 year sentence.  
The next annual meeting of the Association of City School Superintendents will be held at Greensboro.  
Prof. W. L. Peat of Wake Forest College, succeeds Judge H. G. Connor as president of the State Literary and Historical Association. Bishop J. B. Cheshire of Raleigh, Mrs. Nettie F. Townsend of Mt. Airy, and Dr. T. B. Kingbury of Wilmington vice-presidents.  
The Audubon bill for the protection of game and song birds, proposes to tax non-resident gunners. This gun tax, which may be \$10 or \$25 a year, is imposed by 25 States.

**NEW CITY CHARTER.**  
Document in Full to be Ratified by Legislature.  
Will be Submitted to Mass Meeting of Citizens Next Tuesday Night at Court House.  
I present herewith the bill to amend the Charter of the City of New Bern and gotten up by some of the Aldermen with out notice to the people of its contents. It will be introduced in the Legislature. Fellow citizens, how do you like it?  
CITIZENS.  
A bill to be entitled an act to amend Chapter (89) Private laws of 1899, The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact—That Chapter (89) Private laws of 1899 be and the same is hereby amended as follows:—  
At the end of section (35) of said Chapter add the following:  
"That for the purpose of better ordering the sanitary condition of said city, said Aldermen may require the Citizens living along the line of the Sewers of said city, to connect their drains, premises or other pipes with said Sewerage, and in all cases, when required so to do, by said Board of Aldermen, the Citizens living along the line of said Sewers, or owning property along said lines, or in the vicinity thereof shall neglect or refuse to connect their said premises, drains, or other pipes with said sewerage, then and in that event it shall be lawful for said Aldermen after notice to said owners, or their agents, which notice in a case of non-residence may be given in a local newspaper, published in the city for five days, may cause said premises to be properly arranged for health purposes, and property connected with the city sewerage pipes, and shall be so arranged and connected with the least possible expense to the owner, consistent with all sanitary and health precautions—and the expenses of said sanitary arrangements and proper connections shall be paid by the owner of the property so arranged and connected, and said expenses shall be a lien upon said property, premises and lots, and if not paid on demand, such lot and premises or so much thereof as is necessary, may be sold by the Tax Collector of the City of New Bern, to pay said expenses, and costs under the same rules and regulations and restrictions as are required by law for the sale of said lands for unpaid taxes so now provided by said Charter and hereinafter laws of the State now existing; or which may be hereafter enacted, and the same rules and regulations of said arrangements and connections is hereby constituted a lien upon said property to the extent of such costs and expenses."  
Provided, that in order to make said sanitary provisions aforesaid, said Aldermen are hereby authorized and empowered to lay out in said City Sanitary Districts, and to provide in said Districts for the operation of the same and provided, that as soon as all persons and property within said Districts, have complied with the requirements of this section, and have caused their premises and property to be properly arranged and connected with the city sewerage and

**AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION.**  
No Discrimination Favor Either Race. No Separate Taxation.

Raleigh, January 24.—In the House today, Mr. King, of Pitt, introduced a bill to amend a chapter in the Constitution, the people to vote on the question at the next general election.  
The proposed amendment is as follows:  
Sec. 1. That Sec. 2, of article 9, of the Constitution of North Carolina be, and is hereby amended, by striking out the last clause of said section which reads as follows, "But there shall be no discrimination in favor of, or to the prejudice of either race."  
Sec. 2. "That it shall be lawful for either race to be taxed separately and solely for the education of its children, but in all cases there must be some public school facilities offered the children of each race."

to each commissioner in full, for services to be rendered by him.  
That Chapter (89) of the Private Laws of 1901 be amended as follows:—  
Strike out the word, "Board of Aldermen," whenever the same appears in said act and insert in lieu thereof the words "Water and Light Commission."  
That this act shall take effect from and after the date of its ratification and the terms of office herein provided for shall begin and take effect from and after the election and appointment of said officers as herein provided.  
That all laws and clauses of laws inconsistent with or in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.  
We, the undersigned members of the Board of Aldermen request the General Assembly of North Carolina now in session to enact the foregoing amendments to the city charter.
