GRAVEN COUNTY ROAD LAW.

Magistrates Discuss the Measure and Suggest Changes.

A special meeting of the magistrates and County commissioners was held in the Court house yesterday to hear and discuss the law recently introduced in the legislature by Representative Owen H. Gulon relative to the Craven County roads. A large delegation was present.

The law was read by Chairman K. R. Jones and there was considerable discussion on the provisions of the law. A motion was made to request Mr. Gulon to change that clause where it says that upon the application of 25 freeholders certain repairs shall be made on the road, and make it the majority of the freeholders of the township interested.

The magistrates met after adjournment and organized for several townships in compliance with the law. Townships 2, 3, 4, and 7 were organized Saturday.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

Andelini Patti, the celebrated opera singer has signed a contract for a series of concerts in this country to begin Nov. 3, 1903.

The Brooklyn Eagle published at the head of its editorial columns last week the following ticket: "For President, Richard Olney of Massachusetts; for Vice President, Charles B. Aycock of North Carolina.

A strike has been ordered on the Mont real, Ont., street railway and 1500 motor men and conductors have gone out. They want shorter hours.

The street car strike which has been on in the city of Waterbury, Conn., has been settled by arbitration and most of the men have returned to work.

W. J. Bryan, denies in his paper, The Commoner, that he has become a millionaire since the campaign of 1896. He admits that his property has increased greatly since that time.

John Edward Adkins, the perennial Senatorial candidate of Delaware has withdrawn from the race for Senator in that State. He has caused more dead-locks than any other one man in the State.

The negotiations for a settlement of the Venezuelan difficulty have had a set back. The English and German governments resenting the last letter from Bowen, the American Ambassador.

TIME HALF GONE.

Nearly Seven Hundred Bills Introduced to Date.

Public Printing Expenses. Convict Examination Matter. Escaped Convict Caught. Important Railroad Case. Red Men's Profits. Insurance Bill.

Raleigh, February 9.—In the course of an interview today with Assistant Labor Commissioner, Faison, who has charge of the Public printing, he said that for the two years ending February 1st it was \$37,000 less than for the two previous years by \$5,000 on three items, alone, and on all items about \$5,000 less, He will recommend in his report that the State store all its paper used for printing and not leave it in the hands of the Public printers, as he finds that the latter will not make a report upon it. Though quarterly reports are required, he says he has received no report in four years, he recommends that all work ordered by any of the State Departments shall pass through his hands.

The witnesses on the part of the penitentiary in the matter of the charges of cruelty to State convicts near Marion left here today, these being Superintendent Mann and Convict Supervisor, Leahley. The joint committee of the Legislature to investigate this matter left for Marion today, having on last Friday notified J. C. Bird of Marion, who made the very sensational charges to produce his witnesses tomorrow. A number of these witnesses lived in Mitchell county, and it was remarked today that the road to Marion was so bad, that they would probably go to Asheville, and then come down the railway.

Half the Legislative session has gone. About 700 bills have been introduced, and about 175 acts have been ratified.

Last October four county convicts made their escape from a road working gang near this city. One of them seized a guard by the throat while another with an uplifted spade threatened to brain the guard unless the latter surrendered his gun. They took his gun and fled. Today the Sheriff is notified that one had been captured at Norfolk, and another at Franklin, Va.

Before Judge Farnell in the Federal Court here today, there was an argument in an old but yet important and interesting case, that of the city of Durham against the Southern railway and the North Carolina railway involving the ownership of Peabody street in Durham which those roads have long claimed as right of way. A number of lawyers appeared in the case. Among them, W. A. Henderson, Chas. Price, and F. H. B. Crawford for the railways, R. W. Winston, J. B. Boney who has so long been proprietor of the Yarborough House here, and who is to retire from its management, was asked today when Mr. Howell Cobb's lease of the hotel would begin. He said that the date of the expiration of his own lease was December 1st, but that it was probable that Mr. Cobb might arrange for taking over the hotel early in the year so as to get on with his improvement during the summer. Current rumor has it that the hotel will thus change hands about April 1st.

The Red Men's Bazaar recently held here is found to have netted \$1500.

There has been a long fight on the bill to extend Asheville limits. Both sides have made able speeches. The bill has passed the Senate. This afternoon the House Committee gave a final hearing, at which Mr. Bonno spoke for the city.

Miss Mary Currie of Oxford, a daughter of J. M. Currie, died there yesterday of pneumonia. She was a sister of the wife of Rev. W. C. Tyson of Raleigh, and had a brother in Australia.

Insurance Commissioner Young, announces Lloyd's Plate Glass Insurance Company of New York has entered the State, Thos. Griffith of Charlotte being the general agent.

In the House Chairman Dewey of the Insurance committee, has introduced a very long bill containing many amendments to the general insurance laws of 1890. Its chief provision is one allowing Life Insurance companies to be chartered by the Secretary of State, on approval by the Insurance Commissioner just as Fire Insurance companies are chartered, and perfects the mode of procedure in securing all insurance charters. The remainder of the bill is made up of minor corrections of the law of 1890.

Monday's Legislation.

Raleigh, February 9.—A joint resolution was adopted in the House naming a committee to investigate the cost of converting the penitentiary into a hospital for the insane, or other useful purposes.

Bills were introduced regulating the number and net weight of fish in wholesale packages; to require railways to employ competent agents; to require children attending school to be vaccinated.

The resolution asking that the Peabody fund be divided among the Southern States by the trustees was adopted.

A bill was introduced in the Senate requiring railways to pay semi-annually the franchise tax of \$5,000 which shall be refunded at the end of six months, if the corporation commission informs the State Treasurer that such railway has not discriminated against North Carolina shippers.

The bill passed establishing penitentiary parole commission.

Market Letter on Cotton.

By private wire, J. E. Latham & Co.

New York, February 9.—Cotton sold at 9 1/2 this a.m. the high price of the year. There was a good market and Liverpool excited. After the advance there was some selling which carried July back 7 points during the early p.m. There was general support in May and more selling in July. This brought about a premium of 15 points in May. There has been an unlimited amount sold by commission houses and a wave of buying here will carry the advance further for a day or two. We would only buy on heavy breaks along in here as the market has had a big rise and may have a set-back at any time, but on a set-back we would buy. Spots are very firm, and as long as this continues we are not likely to have a change. Receipts this week are starting out well, but not at the interior. The interior movement is not large enough to break the spot market. Speculators are making up and if we can have a few days of speculation we may see the decline.
