### STOLEN WATCH AND BICYCLE.

A Negro Gets Himself in Trouble Through Misappropriation.

About a month ago a boat captain, Q. C. Channel, reported at the City Hall that his watch had been stolen and gave Chief Hargett a minute description of his time piece, the inside and outside numbers, the initials engraved and other features.

Friday a negro named Nelson was arrested for the theft of a bicycle from Capt. Kilpatrick, of the tug boat, Goldboro. The wheel was found in his possession.

It was learned that he had sold a watch to a man up town and upon learning the name of the man to whom he sold it an officer ascertained that it was the same watch which was reported stolen by Capt. Channel.

Nelson, admitted having sold the man the watch but says he found it; he also tried to tell two or three other stories about his connection with the watch but the Mayor thought the evidence against him was so strong that he put him under \$100 bond for his appearance in Court.

The stolen watch is now at the police station awaiting its owner.

### SOME REVENUE CHANGES.

Souvenirs For Hall of History. Crucity to Convicts Report. Telegram of Condolence. Engagement Announced.

Raleigh, February 14.—The joint committee on finance today reported the revenue bill to the House. There are some changes of the bill of 1901. Most of these have already been referred to. The last changes made were in what is known as the merchants' purchase tax. This is fixed by the committee at 40 cts. on the \$1,000 up to \$50,000, 25 cts. up to \$50,000, and 20 cts. above the latter figure. The privilege on dispensaries is put up 2 per cent on gross receipts; on distilleries a license tax ranging from \$35 to \$200; on retail liquor dealers \$150 for each 6 months, wholesale dealers \$200, and beer dealers exclusively \$50; druggists selling liquor \$35 annually instead of \$50. The tax on photographers is made \$5. Persons can sell wine of their own manufacture at the place of manufacture in quantities of not less than one gallon and brandy in original packages not less than 5 gallons. One half of the liquor taxes will go to the State Treasury, the other half to the school fund.

Today there was received and placed in the Hall of History as a loan from Mrs. J. E. Turnbull of Littleton some highly valued souvenirs of that most distinguished North Carolinian, Nathaniel Macon, her great grandfather. These relics are a silver ladle and candle stick and two books with his autograph. The State has had up to this time no relic of this great man.

The sub committee of the legislative committee on the penitentiary has practically concluded its examination into the charges of cruelty to convicts, and will make its report as soon as its stenographer has written out his notes. The investigation has been very complete. It is said that the maker of the charges stated that his witnesses did not testify as strongly when their testimony was given as they did in the affidavits, which he had secured previously.

It is expected that during the coming week night sessions of the legislature will begin. So far that body has kept up with its work exceedingly well. Gov. Aycock sent to Mrs. J. L. M. Curry at Asheville the following telegram: "I beg to convey to you in behalf of North Carolina the sympathy of all her people with you in the death of Dr. Curry. A friend of humanity, having completed his work, rests from his labors."

Mr. Fred C. Olds, formerly of Raleigh and a son of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Olds is to be married in the spring at Waco, Texas, his present home, to Miss Florence Walton Baker, of that city.
