LIQUOR REGULATION

Bills Claim All Attention of Legis-
lature.

Liquor Men Refuse To Talk. De-
murrage Bill Favors Shipper.

A. & M. College Appre-
ciations. Storm Dam-
age in Bertie
County.

Raleigh, Feb. 19.—Most of the talk to-
day was about liquor regulation bill. A
very powerful pressure has been brought
to bear to defeat any and all liquor regu-
lation bills, one of the chief arguments
being that it would cause the Democratic
party to be defeated two years hence.
The liquor men have refused to be inter-
viewed, and have done their work very
quietly indeed. It has been the policy
of the state liquor dealers association for
several years to have no public meetings
and to do its work quietly, avoiding
publicity. Some persons have thought
that the Watta bill would pass the House
and the London bill the senate, and then
there would be a compromise bill.

The demurrage bill which was reported
favorably in the Legislature today is
intended to compel the railroads to han-
dle their cars more quickly from one sta-
tion to another. Under the present regu-
lation the railroads charge if a car is not
promptly unloaded. The purpose of the
bill is to give the receiver of the car a
chance to make a like claim in case the
car is not promptly and properly de-
livered.

Postmaster Bailey, who looks after the
payment of the rural free delivery mail
carriers in North Carolina was today
notified of the establishment this month
of 26 new routes, bringing the total num-
ber up to 223.

The State Agricultural and Mechan-
ical College here asks for total appropri-
ations of \$45,000 a year for each of the
years 1903 and 1904. It will in a separate
bill ask for \$45,000 to pay debts which
were incurred by the burning of Watan-
ga Hall, and the necessary rebuilding of
that and also the construction of the
Pullen Memorial Building. The actual
appropriation for the college is said to
be no greater now, with 503 students,
than it was 8 years ago when there were
only 150.

Francis B Winston arrived today from
Bertie, and says Tuesday night's storm
caused great destruction in that county.
The storm had two paths, one across the
northern and the other across the south-
ern end of the county. From 12 to 15
dwelling houses were blown down and
Watauga Baptist Church was entirely
wrecked. 18 horses were killed, and sev-
eral men, women and children were in-
jured, some seriously, but none fatally.
The loss of timber was immense. A
whirlwind tore through the forests in the
northern part of the county leaving
distraction in its wake.

A charter was granted today to the
Lenoir Lumber Company, of Lenoir,
Caldwell county, capital \$50,000, R. L.
Gwyn and others stockholders.
It is decided that only the sum absolutely
necessary for the insane asylum
shall be appropriated. The State's need
of funds is too great to permit any addi-
tional appropriation.

HOT LEGISLATIVE DISCUSSIONS.

Report Against Christian Science and
Osteopathy. For Code Commission.

Liquor Bills Cause Heated
Arguments.

Raleigh, Feb. 19.—The Legislative
Committee on health, this evening unan-
imously decided to favorably report the
bill, to prohibit the practice of Christian
Science and Osteopathy in North Caro-
lina.

In the House today, bills were in-
troduced to prevent publication of Contem-
ptuous creek; to incorporate town of Dud-
ley; to provide for working prisoners
confined in jail before their trial for
crime; to incorporate Edward, Beaufort
county and to establish a dispensary
there.

The discussion of Watta liquor regu-
lation bill was resumed. Smith com-
pleted the argument on his amendment
submitting the matter of removal of dis-
tilleries and bar rooms to incorporated
towns to a vote of the country people,
equally with the town people.

Lucas opposed Smith's amendment,
said he was willing to disfranchise coun-
try people on this question. Lucas said
he had made a speech against the consti-
tutional amendment disfranchising the
negro, because he thought it did not car-
ry out the party pledges. Smith made
a strong speech supporting Smith's
amendment. The previous question was
called by Watta, but there was so much
confusion, he withdrew it. Further
action was postponed until tonight.

The bill to create a Code commission
with three commissioners to be elected
by the legislature at a salary of \$1,000
came up. The entire cost will not ex-
ceed \$40,000 while the last Code cost \$23
000. The bill passed its second and
third reading.

In the Senate, bills were introduced to
allow railroads to give free transportation
to insane, destitute, and blind peo-
ple; to amend Kinston's charter to
facilitate the sale of certain swamp lands
in Jones and Onslow counties; to pro-
vide revolving scholarships for all public
school teachers in the State.

There was a long argument in the Sen-
ate on the London liquor regulation bill.
Warren made a minority report against
the bill, and offered his bill as a substi-
tute. He spoke, as did London who
ridiculed Warren's bill. The argument
was resumed at tonight's session.
