Child Labor in Factories and Hours of Labor. Liquor Bills Discussed. Bills Passed and Introduced.

HALEIGH, Feb. 21.—The committee appointed to investigate charges of mismanagement and bad treatment of convicts at Dover, reported today that the quantity of food was sufficient, but the bedding filthy and unfit for use, but of sufficient quantity. That there is some sickness, but in the committee's opinion no blame attaches. Supt. Mann for the condition at the same.

In the Senate today bills were introduced to place all Confederate soldiers and their widows on the pension roll by Edwin for electing United States Senators by the people.

Bills passed to charter the Washington and Vandemere railway; for better regulation of fire insurance; and to increase the revenue to the State; to facilitate sale of Allison-Veder swamp lands held by the State in Jones and Onslow counties. This bill was at the request of the State Board of Education.

The bill to regulate child labor in

factories came up on its third reading. Brown offered an amendment, making limit of 66 hours a week's work apply to only persons under 18 years. The amendment was adopted, with another which permits operatives under 18 years to work more than 66 hours, if they so desire. The bill was further amended so as not to apply to the oyster industry, and passed its third reading. No children under 18 years are allowed to be employed in any factory.

The London liquor regulation bill was discussed by White, Lamb, Travis, Justice. The discussion will be resumed tomorrow.

Bills were introduced in the House to tax dogs; to regulate conveyance of real property of married women; to tax mineral water and dealers therein; to protect and promote the oyster industry; for relief of cyclone sufferers in Hertford; to protect telephone and light wires.

The Watts liquor regulation bill and amendments came up on the third reading. The amendment prohibiting manufacture of liquor in towns of less than 500, and sale in towns of less than 300, was lost. All amendments to except counties were lost. King's amendment to make place of delivery place of sale,

being what is known as the anti-jug law was first adopted, but the vote was considered and amendment lost. The House then adjourned until tonight.

MEMBER NEAR DEATH.

Convicts For Public Road Service in Forsythe County.

Prisoners For Pen. State Normal School. Christian Scientists Not Alarmed. Monday's Night Storm. Child Labor Bill.

HALEIGH, Feb. 20.—Representative Freeman of Henderson county today received a telegram stating that his brother A. B. Freeman of Hendersonville is at the point of death. A. B. Freeman is the Republican member of the State election board and is well known.

The sheriff of Buncombe county today brought two negro prisoners to the penitentiary; a man for burglary to serve seven years, and a woman to serve ten for taking her daughter's infant child and throwing it into the woods. Three convicts arrived at the penitentiary from Bertie county; all negro men, to serve 15 year sentences for murder in the second degree. At Roxobel last April they killed a young man and for the crime were convicted of murder in the first degree. They appealed and secured a new trial at which they pleaded guilty of murder in the second degree.

Chairman Doughton of the House branch of the finance committee which is now considering the "Machinery Act" says he is quite confident that the section 50, regarding railways will stand just as it is. This is the section which the railways are fighting, being the one which gives the corporation commission no discretion in arriving at the value of franchises, etc.

Senator Hoey says that there are 28 Senators for the London bill, some of these having been opposed to it until an agreement was made after a conference to strike out section 5 which regards the matter of petition for license.

The Christian Scientists have an idea that while the bill to shut them out from North Carolina as "practitioners" was today unanimously given a favorable committee report, they can in one way or another defeat the bill or prevent action. A member of the committee on public health says they are greatly mistaken and that the bill is certain to become a law, and that public sentiment is very solidly supporting it.

News of the destruction by Monday night's storm in Northeastern North Carolina comes in slowly, but it seems from what has been received that the damage to property and the injury to persons is far greater than was at first supposed. Country houses suffered worst. Much damage was done in Chowan as well as in Bertie and other counties there.

The compromise bill regarding the labor of children in factories appears to give much satisfaction. It is regarded as a step forward.

In the course of an interview with President Melver of the State Normal and Industrial College at Greensboro he said that he was only sending the legislature for \$25,000 special appropriation for a dormitory. It is the desire to have a dormitory with 100 rooms to accommodate 200 students. 90 students now board and room outside of the college and for the past six or seven years at least 300 a year have been turned away for lack of room. This year's enrollment is 470. The gifts to this college from outside the State during the past two years aggregated \$250,000 besides this the students have given \$10,000 for the students building. The Curry building is almost completed. It was the dedication of this that the late Dr. Curry made his last speech. The building cost about \$17,000.

A contract has been made by the penitentiary authorities to furnish not less than fifty convicts to Forsythe county to work on the public roads. This is the first case in which a county has thus used State convicts.

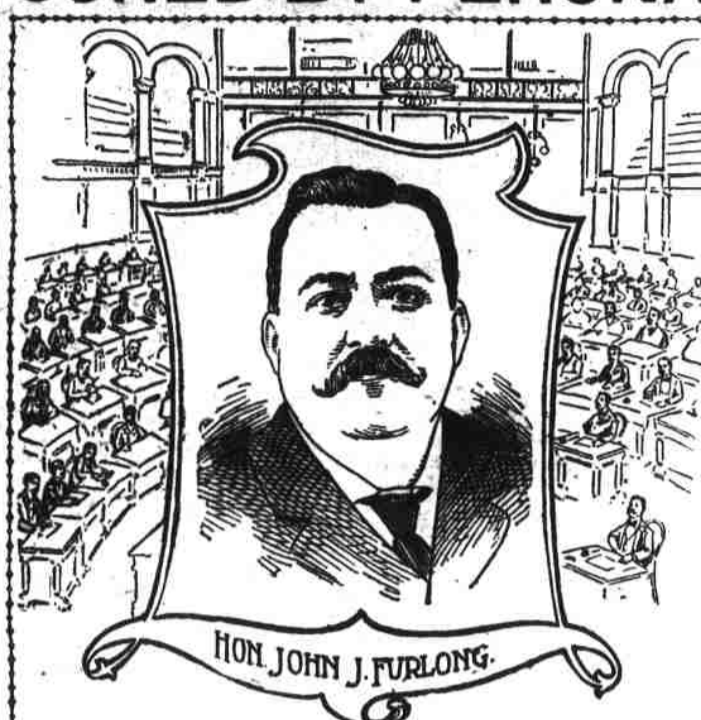
