POSTMASTER ARRANGED

For False Returns. Charter Granted.

Less Talk on Haywood Case.

RALPH, Feb. 26.—A charter was to-
day granted by the State to the Winston
Handle Co., of Winston, capital \$25,000,
W. A. Blair and others stockholders.
The company will make handles of all
kinds, golf clubs and novelties, and is
given power to operate furniture fac-
tories, etc.

The legislature is now working under
what may be called high pressure. The
house was in session until after midnight
last night.

Today, a favorable report was made
by the committee on public buildings
and grounds on a bill providing for the
erection of a state arsenal and hall of
records, on a site purchased by the State
several years ago, adjoining the capitol
square. It is so late in the session that
there is fear the bill may not pass.

R. M. Parker, postmaster at Key, Har-
rington county was arraigned today before
a U. S. Commissioner charged with mak-
ing false returns, as to the amount of
stamp cancelled at his office, for the
purpose of increasing his compensation.
He is also charged with having sent
away a large amount of stamps in pay-
ment for goods. Parker was held to ap-
pear at the Federal court here. His dis-
crepancy is nearly \$400.

There was less talk today about the
Haywood murder case. Haywood's at-
torneys are in nearly constant confer-
ence with him in his cell. The attorneys
for the prosecution, Messrs. Woodward,
Morris, Gilliam, Graham, Daniel, also
have daily conferences. There is in some
quarters comment on the fact that only
one of the Raleigh bar appears for the
prosecution, and it appears that there is
also outside of Raleigh a good deal of
talk about the same thing. The search
for witnesses of course continues.

Today the typewriter finished the long
report of the investigating committee on
the charges of cruelty to convicts at
Marion. Senator Warren, the chairman
said the committee would at once make
up its report on the evidence.

Market Letter on Cotton.

New York, Feb. 26.—There was less
cotton for sale at 10c this a. m. than at
9c a month ago. The oldest men in the
business are standing around the pit,
saying what does it all mean, and no
one is able to answer. One would think
we had a crop of about 5 millions by the
way cotton is bought. The fever is one
of those inexplicable things in specula-
tion, that has to run its course. These
long cotton keep their step less order
on and let the market go. It is not
going to 10c or 11c, let it go. This ad-
vance may be legitimate, but we have
yet to find 10 cent cotton a satisfactory
buy. It is a serious business also to sell.
The weather in the South is very bad. It
must get better some day. There is
nothing to break cotton on, until so-
meone is much larger, or until the
climate starts to warm. It is the worst
seasonal market in 15 years and with
and cotton is the only one. We must
wait.

THURSDAY'S BILL

Anti-Jug Law Bill Receives Favor-
able Report.

Sites For Monuments. Money Loan-
ed To Build Public Schools
Pilgrimage Bill Tabled. Pro-
hibit Sale Cigarettes. Sa-
loon Closing Bill.

RALPH, Feb. 26.—In the Senate to-
day bills were introduced to allow Guil-
ford Battle Ground Association to give
the United States sites for monuments
to the revolutionary generals Davidson
and Nash, to incorporate the Chowan
and Aulander railway.

The Wilmington Pilgrimage bill was
tabled by a vote of 20 to 11. The bill
to allow the State funds of \$20,000 to be
lent to counties for building public
schools passed its second reading. The
bill passed to let the oyster patrol steam-
er Little, so it can buy a naphtha boat to
take its place.

By a unanimous vote the House com-
mittee on health this evening decided to
favorably report a bill prohibiting the
manufacture and sale of cigarettes and
cigarette papers in North Carolina.

An other committee decided to favor-
ably report the bill making the place of
delivery of liquor, the place of sale this
being what is known as "Anti-Jug law"
and also a bill requiring saloons to close
at 8 p. m. and not open before 8 a. m.

SALTER PATH.

Feb. 26.—Our fishermen are troubled
some about the scarcity of fish now,
clams are very scarce also, and the price
is less, only 75c bushel.

Creek, on the main land opposite here,
and has bought a place and is now build-
ing a nice dwelling house there. We
guess Loano will engage in the fish and
clam business as well as merchandising
also buy furs.

are our two merchants.

Ducks and geese are scarce this winter
here than in many years, and the pond
ducks are also very scarce, coons and
possums are plentiful and their hide sell
for 30c to 40c each.

Mr. Asa Dixon on Broad creek, made
\$4.00 in one day and night last week
catching coons and possums.

Our men are somewhat frightened
about the hunting (freighting) for
geese and ducks, they don't know the
law right.

Mr. Cooper Adams, is assisting Mr.
A. Guthrie in building his houses on
Broad Creek.

Mr. D. J. Willis, is in the cedar post
business he makes good wages at that,
from \$1.00 to \$2.00 per day now.

Mr. G. W. Ward the school teacher
here, is joying along as usual with his
little pupils, five or six is about the
number that attend regular, out of some
20 of school age, but their parents or
some of them, seem to be getting scared
about the compulsory law talk the
teacher and a few other here, tell them
if they won't make their children go to
the schools at home, they will be taken
away from them and send off to school,
that talk gets them.

The law taxing dogs \$1.00 agrees with
them so they say, "We guess the law is
regarding to killing deer, that is, to pre-
vent their hunting is in force, now we
hope it will be strictly enforced here.
There is plenty of wild deer on these
banks, and they ought to be protected.
We had another big deer drive here
last week and had some better luck
then before, our round killed and caught
4 fine deer, and some parties on the
east of us, killed one or two more."

ITEMS FROM ITALY.

Italy devotes \$200,000 a year to the
support of Italian schools in foreign
countries.

In Italy the price of salt has been re-
duced 50 per cent by the government,
whose monopoly it is.

It is proposed to erect a monument to
Dante in Rome on the site now occu-
pied by the equestrian statue of Mar-
cus Aurelius.

Official inquiries show that 5,000
models, 223 engravings and 127 de-
signs and paintings have been stolen
from the museum at Bassano, near
Venice.

In view of the scare as to the pos-
sibility of typewriter records the
Italian minister for justice has de-
cided that no typewriter document
will be accepted as legal in Italy.

Aycock's Decision.

furnish base for such monument.

urging that both Nash and Davidson
monuments be placed on Guilford Battle
Ground.
