MONUMENT QUARREL.

Over Those of Generals Nash and
Davidson.

Candidate for Governor. Code Com-
missioners are Satisfactory.
Changes in Pension Law.
New Bills Introduced.
Charter Granted.

RALEIGH, Feb. 27.—The Daughters of
the Revolution had a meeting today,
at which they adopted a resolution urg-
ing Governor Aycock to recommend that
the monument to General Davidson and
Nash be erected in Raleigh. In 1898 the
Daughters of the Revolution took the
first action they say in regard to these
monuments. One of them stated today
that Congressmen Kitchen of the 5th
district would be here to urge that both
monuments be erected on the battle-
ground of Guilford Court house. The
Daughters think that both the monu-
ments should be here at the capitol, as
no particular place in the State can jus-
tly lay claim to them.

It is said that representative Augustus
W. Graham, of Granville, is an aspirant
for the next Democratic nomination for
Governor. He has been very prominent
at this session of the legislature.

A number of Robeson county people
were here today to appear before the
committee on counties, cities and towns,
for or against a bill to remove the coun-
ty seat of Robeson from Lumberton to
Pembroke, the latter place being the
point where the S. A. L. and Atlantic
Coast Line intersect.

A charter was granted to the Accele-
rate Chemical Company of Warrenton, to
manufacture, sell and buy chemicals and
pharmaceutical and medicinal prepara-
tions; capital \$5000, R. K. Hunter and
others stockholders.

One of the legislators, in speaking yester-
day, on a pension bill, said there were
four ex-confederate veterans in the coun-
ty home here. One of the officials of the
home said today this was true, and that
two of these men had been dismissed
from the home for drunkenness and dis-
orderly conduct, another one for steal-
ing, and that the fourth was a deserter.

There appears to be very general satis-
faction at the selection of Mr. Y. Gulley
T. B. Womack and W. B. Rodman as
code commissioners.

Governor Aycock received a petition
from citizens of Nashville, asking that
the monument to General Nash be lo-
cated there, as the town has been named
after him. Another letter stated that
the bill as passed by congress for the
monuments to Nash and Davidson was
with the understanding that both were
to be located on the Guilford Battle
Ground.

It is said there will be several applica-
tions for charters for places where whis-
key distilleries are located. The first
application was made today, and was for
the incorporation of Williams, Yadkin
county, where for three generations the
Williams family has had a distillery. Mr.
H. Glenn Williams was here today in re-
gard to the matter, and Mr. Nicolson in-
troduced the bill.

In the course of an interview with
Auditor Dixon today regarding the
amended pension law, he said that it
made some valuable changes. Under it
the county pension board which up to
this time has been composed of the
county commissioners, sheriff and clerk,
will be composed of three ex-confederate
veterans and the clerk in other words,
what has up to this time been known as
the advisory board is now the pension
board. The veterans on the board will
be appointed by Dr. Dixon, the Auditor.
He says many counties have no advisory
board at all. He will consult the repre-
sentatives, as well as the sheriff and
clerk, before he appoints the board, as
he is determined to get the best man in
each county. The bill as introduced al-
lowed \$2 a day to each member for not
more than three days in the year, but
the House cut this out, as the county
commissioners get paid at the same rate,
it really seems hard that the veterans
should not do so; that they should have
to do the work, pay their own expenses,
to the county town, and get no allow-
ance. The bill originally provided that
they should be paid by the county. An-
other amendment of the law has been
specially favored to before this being the
widows of soldiers, who remarried after
April 1st, and are again widows are ad-
mitted to pensions. The present law bar-
red all who married after April 1st, 1865.

Auditor Dixon says he looks for an in-
crease in the number of pensioners; that
more soldiers will be added than will die
and then too, that there will be an in-
crease probably of 200 or 300 widows.
The auditor was asked about the desired
appropriation for the soldiers home, and
said the regular appropriation of \$18,000
annually was asked to be continued,
with a special annual appropriation for
improvements to be used in placing the
cottages in proper condition, enlarging
the dining room, etc.

Today's new judge of superior at Pon-

those of the out going mayor. Senator

Thus far the number of House bills is
184. At the session two years ago, it
ran over 2,300.

The calculation made by the finance
committee is that the new revenue act
will raise annually \$150,000 more than
that of 1901.

A bill introduced today required the
superintendents of all State institutions
to file plans and specifications for all
improvements and extensions, and to
also file bids made to do the work, ac-
companied by the bond of contractors
who do the work.

INCREASING NUMBER BILLS

Rushing Through Legislature. Barring
Republican Counties. Oyster
Law Amended.

RALEIGH, Feb. 27.—In the Senate to-
day White introduced a bill for the bet-
ter regulation of fire insurance and to
increase the public revenue, which im-
mediately passed. Other bills were in-
troduced, to incorporate the Southport
and North Eastern railway; to establish
and improve the road from Kinston to
Jacksonville, to make railways furnish
free transportation to certain State of-
ficials.

The Code Commission bill was so
amended as to contain the names of N.
B. Gulley, T. B. Womack and W. B.
Rodman as commissioners passed final
reading; Goodwin's bill regarding the
prevention of fire was to come up as a
special order and though White stated
it would save at least \$75,000 annually,
in insurance premiums, it was tabled.

Bills passed to enable Norfolk and
Western railway to build an extension
in North Carolina; to incorporate Vir-
ginia and Carolina railways; to appro-
priate \$25,000 for State Arsenal and hall
of records; to allow coroners to make
post mortems, when they are physicians;
to authorize State Board of Education
to lend State library fund which is now
\$200,000, to county boards for building
school houses; bill to provide for hold-
ing municipal elections designed to ap-
ply to Republican towns came up, and
was amended so as to exempt nearly all
counties save republican ones. (Hoey
said this bill was absolutely necessary,
for republican towns would register
every body and easily, lest constitu-
tion at amendment. The bill passed.

The following bills were introduced
in the House: to repeal law regarding
use of Dutch nets in Lenoir; to prohibit
drunkenness; to prohibit killing deer and
partridges in Jones; to tax traveling hogs
and egg purchasers; to prohibit hunting
on lands of another without consent; to
appoint magistrates in Jones; to give
justices power to sentence persons to
work on public roads; to regulate public
road work in Orange.

Bills were passed prohibiting the sale,
manufacture and importation of liquor
in Gaston, Cleveland, Cabarrus and
Mitchell counties. The system law was
taken up cutting off five sub-commissio-
ners who received \$450 each under the
old law, and providing one substitute at
\$200, increasing commissioners salary
from \$700 to \$800, and being \$110 less
than old law. Expense of conducting
service last year was \$27,500 and receipts
\$24,000. The bill passed second and
third readings.

Revenue bill came up on third read-
ing. All amendments defeated save one
making license tax on all dealers \$100
instead of \$75. A bill was introduced
making physicians liable for giving pre-
scriptions for whiskey on Sunday or
days in past years. Bill passed over-
riding the prohibition of giving
