West vs. East on Joint Appropriations Committee.

Illicit Distillery Seizures. Few Convicts Arriving. Express People Want Reduction. Memorial Library. Inmates Soldiers' Home.

RALEIGH, March 3.—Capt. E. E. Winslow of the corps of engineers, U. S. A., arrived here today from Wilmington to confer with the Governor regarding the monuments to Generals Nash and Davidson.

There are now 104 inmates of the Soldiers' Home here, and 120 on the roll. This is the limit which can be cared for under the present annual appropriation.

Revenue officers say the number of seizures of illicit distilleries has fallen off considerably. They do not know whether illicit distilling is on the decrease or not. They know that moonshiners continue to move eastward.

Very few convicts have arrived at the penitentiary this year. Three arrived today from Columbus county. As soon as spring opens, convicts will be put on all the railway work possible, as this is the most remunerative. There was never a greater demand for convicts than at present. One county will get about 50 of them for road building.

The express people are endeavoring to get a reduction of their tax rate in the revenue bill. They were willing to pay a cent a mile but the bill names 2c. as the rate.

State Superintendent, Joyner, is in high spirits at the prospect of the passage of the excellent bill to allow the \$300,000 now in the State Literary fund to be lent to counties for building school houses.

Up to this date 22 sheriffs have settled in full their State taxes. A full set of the North Carolina Supreme Court reports, which was owned by the late ex-Judge John Gray Bynum, of Greensboro, has been placed in the Supreme Court library as a memorial of him.

No committee has been so harassed as the joint one on appropriations. There has been pulling and hauling at every meeting. When some member would say that an appropriation must be had for some western institution, some eastern member would immediately get up and say, well that's all right, but if you get it we must have one for some of our eastern institutions. And so it came about that for session after session very little was done.

Revenue officers made a raid at Margaretville on some "blind tigers" which had for some time been doing business both in North Carolina and Virginia. They captured the entire outfit, two white men and two negroes, and have them in jail.

Supreme Court Opinions.

Hughes vs Gay, from Northampton, error. Norwood vs Laster, from Northampton, affirmed. Lindsay vs Railroad, from Currituck, affirmed.

The following were disposed of by per curiam order: Foy vs Railroad, from Craven, affirmed. Betchelor vs Braswell, from Nash, motion to docket and dismiss defendants appeal under rule 17, allowed.

Westbrook vs Lumber Co., from Sampson, motion to docket and dismiss defendants appeal, under rule 17 allowed. Telephone Co. vs Blossom, from New Hanover, motion to docket and dismiss defendants appeal under rule 11 allowed.

Public School Law Amendment.

RALEIGH, March 3.—The bill covering the public school law amendments, was passed as prepared by the joint committee on education.

Only one change was made, this being in regard to amount of reserve fund of counties for building, repairing and equipping school houses, 20 per cent where school funds is \$5,000 or less, 16 per cent where over \$5,000 and under \$10,000, where over \$10,000 and over \$10,000 10 per cent, and where over \$25,000, not over 8 per cent.

TUESDAY'S LEGISLATION

Bills Pushed Forward. Public School Appropriation, No Liquor Sale in Pamlico Co.

RALEIGH, March 3.—Bills were introduced in the House to enable the Agricultural department to erect an agricultural building at the Agricultural and Mechanical college; to regulate sale of substitutes for butter; to prohibit sale of intoxicating drinks in Pamlico Co., to restore the office of Standard keeper in certain counties.

Bill was passed to allow sales of liquors at Nags Head hotel; to authorize Tyrrell County to issue bonds and levy a special tax to build court house and jail; to incorporate Virginia Carolina Southern railway; to allow citizens of Wilmington to vote on acceptance of Carnegie library; to amend chapter 54, laws 1901, relating to investigation of fire; to incorporate Audubon Society of North Carolina for protection of song and game birds.

Bills were introduced to provide for payment of half fee for witnesses, when no true bills is found; to continue charter of Jacksonville and Kinston railway.

The Senate took up the bill appropriating \$300,000 to public schools. It passed 2nd reading. It appropriates \$100,000 to be divided per capita, and \$100,000 to bring terms up to four months. Any sums raised by people in school districts are not to be counted as against county school appropriations, and it is said this will increase terms and save the State at least \$25,000.

The bill allowing the people of Robeson County to vote on moving court house from Lumberton to Pembroke was passed.

UNFAVORABLE REPORT

By Committee, On Reformatory Bill of King's Daughters.

Raleigh, March 3.—An unfavorable report was today made by the appropriation committee on the State reformatory bill.

This is the bill known as the reformatory bill, which is being so earnestly pressed by the King's Daughters. It has never passed the house or senate, but was referred to this committee. It carried a small State appropriation.

Its introducer will now endeavor to strike out the appropriation and get a simple charter.

DISTILLERY TOWNS.

North Carolina Will Overrun With Such Incorporated Places.

Raleigh, March 3.—There is quite a lot of talk about the bills to incorporate distilleries as towns.

It is claimed on the one hand by the owners of the distilleries that they are old, established places, and not like the ordinary stills which are moved here and there.

On the other hand, people ridicule the idea, and say it is a funny sight, after the passage of the Watts bill which did not give the size of "incorporated towns," to see the legislature chartering distilleries.

A great many people think this failure to have minimum population of a place which may be incorporated is a defect in the Watts bill. A great deal of lobbying is being done in the interest of these distillery towns.
