Eye Exercise.

An exercise which, if perseveringly practiced, will greatly strengthen the eyes and which has entirely restored many cases of impaired vision, so that spectacles and eyeglasses were discarded, is to turn the eyes upward and downward alternately, as far as possible, twenty times, says a writer in the New York Herald. "Don't pause in the upward glance." The action is inconstant, but not hasty. Next turn the eyes to the right and to the left, repeating as before. Turn them to the upper left corner and to the opposite diagonally—that is, to lower right corner. Repeat. Turn them to the upper right corner and to the lower left. Conclude the exercise with rolling the eyes around, first to the right, then to the left, in the extreme limit of the muscular extension, being careful, however, not to strain the muscles.

If the exercise is repeated at convenient intervals during the day, it will soon strengthen the muscles.
