Market Letter on Cotton.

New York, March 14.—The most sensational opening of the season. May started at 9.00. Liverpool declined to 5.00 for May and then shot up 7 points on Egyptian buying. An advance of 7 points on yesterday should have started May about 9.75, or a flurry at 9.75, but the bulls sent it broken and before any one offered cotton 9.50 was bid. This started shorts who paid 9.51, and then holders turned sellers carrying it back 14 points. This only shows the condition of the market. It should cause one to avoid selling on a break. There are no indications that May will shoot over 10c again. We might have 9.00 or 9.25 easily, but we are still disposed to regard the bull market as over. As this view is correct August is a sale on every good rally. The power of the bull clique is too strong, the stock here too small, the season too backward to make short selling on a break anything but foolhardy. On a good uptick the advantage seems to be with the shorts. Hales in the South increase dangers of floods again. This weather is something beyond the memory of men. If it clears we will have a quieter market, but as long as it don't we might as well make up our minds to a wild market. Cover when it gets weak but sell August short on bulges. C. W. Lee & Co.

Provisions in A. & M. College Appropriation Bill.

Body of E. G. Harrell Arrives From Manila. Inquiries on New Laws. New Insurance Company. Public Lands. Brick Making Machinery.

RALEIGH, March 14.—Today the body of Eugene G. Harrell arrived here from Manila, where he died a few days before last Christmas. A masonic and military funeral will be given.

State Superintendent J. Y. Joyner today at Greenville addressed the Teachers Association of Pitt county.

The search among the great mass of laws enacted by the Legislature continues. Inquiries regarding these pour in from all parts of the State.

No less than 9 insurance companies were chartered by the last Legislature, this breaking the record at one session.

It was expected last year that the shops of the S. A. L. here which were burned early in 1899 would be rebuilt, but nothing has been done and there is now no prospect of anything being done.

Under the new law the cost per acre for public lands entered is fifty cents.

It is expected that amendments made to the law regarding these lands will largely increase the State revenue.

Heretofore all the brick made at the penitentiary has been made by hand, and the work has not been remunerative, but now a brick making machine is to be put in.

The appropriation bill passed by the legislature requires the State to appropriate this year for the support and maintenance of the A. & M. College, \$20,000, being \$10,000 more than heretofore; it requires that after the expiration of one year the Agricultural Department shall pay from its revenue \$10,000 annually for three years for the support and maintenance of the college; it further requires that the board of agriculture shall provide from its fund not to exceed \$12,000 for the completion of the Pullen and Waugaus Building; it also provides for the payment by the state of \$63,700 to pay the college debt; and it also provides that in future there shall be only 120 free scholarships, that is one for each member of the lower house.
