STATE BOND BIDS.

Discussion Regarding Haywood Trial Next week.

State Printing. Conjects For Pen. State Charters. The Durham Depot. Attempt to Arrest Navy Deserter. Copies New Pension Law.

RALEIGH, March 18.—A number of bids for the new State bonds are being received by Treasurer Lacy, as the bids are sealed, he does not know for what amount they are.

The State public printing board, of which Governor Aycock is the head met today and advertised for bids for the State printing for the next two years.

A commission was today issued to Rev. Alpheus McCullen of Oxford as Chaplain of the 8rd., regiment, N. C., S. G.

Sheriff Home of Halifax today brought five convicts to the penitentiary, one of them a negro, to serve five years for forging a \$500 check on the Scotland Neck Bank. He would have been given a longer term had not a physician stated that he was mentally unbalanced.

A charter is granted to the Myrtle Grove Building and Trust Co., of New Hanover county, with leave to run on operate saw mills, steam boats, shell road, barges and flats, hotels, and other resorts on Myrtle Grove Sound, also to ship fish, etc., capital \$25,000.

Another charter is granted the Ivy Mill Co., to manufacture cotton fabrics, capital \$135,000; place of business Hickory, A. A. Shuford and other stockholders.

State Auditor Dixon today received his appointment from Governor Aycock as the State's representative to furnish the U. S. War Department with information regarding North Carolina's Confederate troops. Auditor Dixon said he would get actively at work at once, so as to lose no time in securing the information.

The Southern, S. A. L. and Norfolk and Western Railway will be given a hearing by the corporation commission March 28th, regarding the Union Depot at Durham, in order to see whether the design submitted by the Southern Railway is satisfactory to all. This design is for a \$50,000 building, and is submitted by the Southern, which will construct the building, and give the other road trackage rights, or will join with them in erecting it.

Very few persons can be found who believe that the Haywood murder case will be tried next week. The remarkable reticence of the attorneys continues. It is very natural that as regards witnesses, etc., there should be reticence, but there seems no reason for it, as regards an effort to secure a continuance.

Two deputy sheriffs went out to a suburb of Raleigh last evening to arrest D. Russell, a deserter from the Navy, who is also charged with assaulting and holding up a man for robbery last Saturday night. Russell was found at his father's home, he ran and was fired at three times. His father claims he is under 21 years of age.

Copies of the new pension law were today sent out by the State Auditor.

State Weather, February.

Raleigh, March 19.—The weather report for February for North Carolina was issued today.

The month was comparatively mild, but the rain fall was very heavy especially in the West, being 2 inches and one half above normal, all over the State and 4 inches above in the west, at one place Highlands, 10in.

The mean temperature was 45 degrees, which is 3 degrees above normal; the highest being 52 at Wilmington, and the lowest 35 at Linville.

The highest absolute temperature was 78 degrees at Wilmington on the 14th, and the lowest 8 degrees below zero at Lenoir on the 18th. It was the warmest February since 1891, the average rainfall was 6.71 inches.
