## SHERIFFS ARE SLOW

In Making Full Returns For 1902.

Trinity College Enrollment. Hangman's Day. Big Damage Suits Against Seaboard Air Line Catalogue For State Museum.

RALEIGH, April 7.--Only 88 of the 97 sheriffs in the State have thus far settled their taxes with the State treasurer for 1902. They are much slower than usual in making their returns and this is hard to account for unless it is because the State Auditor is very exact, especially on schedule B, and has sent back to several sheriffs their reports for correction.

Capt Wm E Merritt, formerly conductor on the Atlantic Coast Line at Wilmington, has moved here and taken a run on the Seaboard Air Line.

President Jno. C Kilgo, of Trinity, spent the day here. He states that there are now 363 students at Trinity which is more than three times the number enrolled when he became president.

Supt. J Y Joyner is very confident that friends of education will win in the local taxation election in Wilkesboro today. He says that the people he met in the West all seemed very much pleased with the Watts bill.

Gov. Aycock fixes Saturday, May 16th, for the execution of Vance Spivey in Halifax and Fred Vick in Wayne. Spivey killed another negro convict on the Halifax farm while Vick is sentenced to die for rape.

The first trade mark recorded in the Secretary of State's office under the new law authorizing the registration of trade marks is "E A Lockey's Pure N C Silver top Corn Whiskey." The trade mark has Lockey's picture and is in silver and blue, Lockey lives at Hamlet.

The Capitol Club will give its April get-together next Tuesday night April 14th.

Messrs. Busbee and Busbee as attorneys for six insurance companies today instituted suit against the Seaboard Air Line for the burning of the cotton compress and other property at Hamlet last October. The amount of damages asked is about \$60,000. Messrs A Jones and Son, attorneys for Cunningham and Hinchaw, are also suing the same railroad for about \$30,000 for cotton burned in the fire.

Judge Bryan holds a term of Civil Court here beginning April 20th. Among the cases to be tried is the suit of the Raleigh Hoistery mill against the Seaboard Air Line for \$30,000 for burning their mill.

Collector E C Duncan was much amused today at a special in a paper here that he would resign as collector in order to become Republican State chairman. "What do you think of a man resigning his job for a place that pays nothing?" he said with a chuckle.

The Eastern Lead and Timber Co. of Windsor was incorporated today with \$25,000 capital.

Sheriff E B Norman of Chowan brought 3 negro convicts to the penitentiary.

Senator Lee B Overman is here attending the Supreme Court.

President W. J. Andrews of the Raleigh Street Railways says that the North Carolina law forbidding running open cars during March. So all the balmy days last month these cars had to be used.

The average number of visitors at the State Museum is 75 a day. The suggestion has been made that a catalogue of the museum and hall of history be printed and sold to visitors. This is done in all the large museums and art galleries and is certainly needed here.

Tomorrow is the time set by law for the annual meeting of all the State hospital boards. The members of the board of the Central hospital are now here. They will elect a matron and steward at this session. Supt. McKee has arranged for consulting the hospital with the Wake Forest Company. The Legislature provided for this at its last session. The work will cost \$4,000. The State board of examiners last fall condemned the present water supply for the hospital and recommended this change.

Miss Sula Beck, one of Raleigh's most gifted young women, has written a book which will shortly be published by Newberry & Co. of New York. It is entitled "Reveries of a Bachelor Maid."

The Atlantic Coast Line, will for this event--the event of a life time for our people, put on a special excursion rate of one fare for the round trip, from all points on their line. In the event of Mr. Collier, securing a hundred or more in a party, from New Bern and immediate points--a special train will be run back to our city, leaving Wilmington about midnight, after the concert.

Owing to the vast amount of work connected with this attraction requiring him at Wilmington he will be with us but one day. 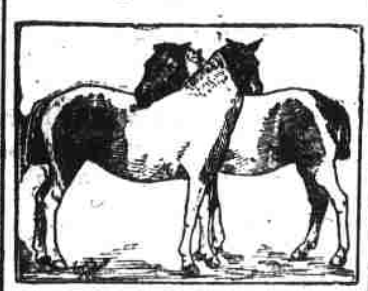
