

AFTER 14 YEARS.

Land Case In Wilkes County Pinally Settled.

Petition Against Union Depot. Delegates to Road Congress. Like North Carolina School House Plans. For Penitentiary.

RALEIGE, April 16.—A case was argued in the Supreme Court last afternoon that has been on the calendar in Wilkes county fourteen years and has twice before been to the Supreme Court. It is entitled L. D. Lowe and wife against James Harris and others. The suit was begun in March 1889 and has been stubbornly fought. The original plaintiff and one defendant have died in the meanwhile but the battle over this small tract of land claimed by au old negro went on.
