REDUCED ACREAGE

In Cotton and Corn on Account of Weather.

Returned to Moonshining. Stanly County Bond Case. State Charter. Legislative Acts Will Be Complete. State Printing Matter.

RALPH, April 24.—Today the Secretary of State received the "captions" of the acts of the legislature. These were prepared by W. P. Bachelor and more complete than ever before. There follows each caption a very complete synopsis of the act in question. There is a full index, in fact a cross index, and the date of ratification of acts is shown. The numbers will agree with those of the laws which will appear in book form. The pamphlet is more than twice as large as ever before.

A. M. Urell is now the public printer. For some years the work was divided between him and Edwards & Broughton. The latter firm notified the commissioner of labor and printing that it could not go on with the work, but the Governor wrote the firm, saying the work in hand must be done. The Governor says the printing will be done. Of course there will be delay. All the copy for the laws and journals has been ready for a month past.

A letter from Mr. Morehead of Greensboro says the name of Gen. Davidson, who was killed at the battle of Cowan's Fort, February 1, 1781, was simply "William" and not "William Lee." This statement will no doubt provoke inquiry and research.

Mrs. D. E. McDonald of Prince Edward Island, Canada, writes the Secretary of State, making inquiry regarding a North Carolina estate which was held by John McDonald, her ancestor.

The number of volumes in the Supreme Court library is now 14,002, which on the 1st of January, 1899, it was only 4,960. In January 1899, there were 24,000 volumes in the State library. The exact number at present is not known, but probably approximates 25,000.

There are now 1,487 election precincts in the State, this being the number reported to the Secretary of State.

An oil portrait of the late Dr George L. Kirby, who was for several years the Superintendent of the hospital for the insane here, has been presented to the State library.

W A Gattis, a well known business man here and an ex-Confederate Veteran was stricken with paralysis while on the state today, and fell. He lost the power of speech completely.

A charter is granted the New Hanover Shingle Mills (Incorporated) of Wilmington, capital \$60,000, the owners being O W Mitchell, of Anderson, W P Taylor of Winton and H A Brown, Jr., of New Bern.

Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson says the rainy weather will very probably reduce the acreage of both cotton and corn. A great question is how to get labor on the farms. It is very scarce, the reports to the department show. Farm operations are backward two or three weeks. There is considerable emigration of negroes, not only from the farms, but from the small towns. It is said most of these emigrants are now going to New Jersey, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and New York.

A few weeks ago an old moonshiner was sentenced to imprisonment by Judge Farnell. The man's son called on the judge, on his knees, to pardon the prisoner, which the judge did. Now it turns out that the old man is again "moonshining."

Ex-judge James E. Shepherd went to Washington, D.C. today to argue the Stanly county bond case before the United States Supreme Court. In this case the county seeks to repudiate certain bonds which are owned by Color & Co. of N. Y. and which it says were issued under an act not properly ratified by the legislature.
