HAYWOOD CASE HEARD.

Two Witnesses Testify as to Skinner Peeling Shot. Haywood's Appearance Special to Journal.

RATION, May 28.—At the hearing this afternoon of habeas corpus case of Ernest Haywood, charged with murder of Andrew Skinner, Justice Douglas and Walker presided, the latter sitting at Douglas's request. Haywood was brought in accompanied by six attorneys and three of his brothers. He looked very haggard. The court room was thronged. Attorney Argo asked for Haywood's release on bail. Bernard Smith, of Baltimore, the first witness sworn to saw Haywood and Skinner talking at the postoffice, saw Skinner strike Haywood, that Skinner then stepped back and started toward Haywood again, and then Haywood shot. Skinner staggered back and stepped off the curb and then was shot again.

Robert N. Simms, Attorney, of Raleigh was next witness. Said he saw two men struggling at post office steps. That Skinner struck Haywood, who sprang back. That first shot was then fired by Haywood, that Skinner hesitated a moment and then went towards car track in centre of street; that when he was ten feet from car track, the second shot was fired; that Skinner was moving rapidly, crossed track and then fell.

Governor Aycock and many others including Joseph Daniels, Robert A. Furman, Rev Dr T. N. Ivey, and Mayor Powell, testified to Simms' good character.

The matter will again come up in the morning and there will be six hours hearing, which will probably be continued Monday. Cross examination by the State is very rigid and is being mainly conducted by Walter Daniel and Donald Gilliam. The State is saying nothing of its plans.

EXCEPTION FILED.

By Railroads to Circular of Corporation Commissioner.

United States Census 1790 Received. The Blaisdel Case. Crop Complaint. State Charters Granted.

RATION, May 28.—The Atlantic Coast Line, Southern and Carolina and North-western railroads have filed exceptions to the circular recently issued by the Corporation Commissioner, providing rules and regulations for storage and demurrage charges and fixing the time limit for the delivery of freight. The exceptions are filed through Percy R. Albright, manager North Carolina Car Service Association.

The U. S. census of 1790, so far as North Carolina names are concerned, has been received here and will be published in the 22nd volume of N. C. State Records. The list is complete save as to three counties, and for the latter Judge Walter Clark, the editor of the State Records, has secured as a substitute copies of the list.

The contest between the State and Federal authorities regarding the case of Lt. Blaisdel of the revenue cutter at New Bern is interesting. It is said that Blaisdel discharged coxswain Ryman and later arrested Ryman and had him ironed. Then Ryman had Blaisdel arrested by the sheriff.

TERRIFIC TORNADOES.

Loss of Life and Property in the West Has Been Great.

Chicago, May 27.—The devastation in the middle west by wind and flood continues. Within the past week nearly one hundred persons have been killed, many hundreds injured and millions of dollars worth of property destroyed.

Kokomo, Ind., May 27.—Kokomo was visited by the worst storm in years this afternoon. Several factories were partly destroyed. Hundreds of dwellings were damaged. The loss in Kokomo and vicinity will reach \$200,000. Rain and hail came in torrents. No fatalities are reported.

Des Moines, May 27.—Despite predictions of fair weather by the weather bureau another terrific rain storm struck this city today. Thousands of anxious persons are spending sleepless nights while a small army of men are employed on the levees and others are patrolling the danger districts. Several hundred families have moved from their homes.

Mayville, Mo., May 27.—The east of town of Kimo has been wiped out by a fearful tornado. Nine persons were killed outright and many were injured; some of whom will die. The Washburn railroad station was struck first and demolished. The agent was at his desk when the building fell, and he was slightly hurt. The Masonic temple, a brick building, stood east of the station. The storm picked off a couple of freight cars, and piled one or two on three frame buildings and then tore the brick building asunder.

Forty-three people were in the Masonic temple. They were buried under the debris. Of these only five escaped death.
