Hello!  
Hello! Hello!  
Is this the office of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company?

Board Aldermen Meeting.  
New Bern N. C. June 10  
Board met pursuant to recess—Mayor Ellis presiding—Aldermen present, Hyman, Banger, Dawson, Avery, Lane, Phillips, Wood, Watson, Gulon, and Hollowell.  
Mayor stated their object of meeting was to receive report of committee and consider any other business before the board.  
Bill of the New Bern Street Railway and Electric Co. referred at a previous meeting was presented to the board—discussed and upon motion of Alderman Lane the bill was tabled.  
Clerk stated that he overlooked the bill for Supt. of Fire Alarm, due for the month of May, and upon motion a voucher was ordered issued for \$10 in favor of B. F. Williams for same.  
Police Committee recommended the amount deducted from Police Montague's salary be paid him. Upon motion a voucher for \$9 was ordered issued to him for same.  
Upon motion the Mayor and Clerk were instructed to order helmets for policemen suitable for summer use.  
Upon motion of Alderman Lane the superintendent of the fire alarm system was awarded to Water and Light Commission at \$10.00 per month, and ordered that Mr R. P. Williams be notified to turn over to said Commission the keys and all other property belonging to said system.  
Reported that Amore St., extended as being obstructed. Upon motion was referred to Street and Pumps Committee.  
The Property, and Water and Light Commission reported that satisfactory arrangement had been made with Water and Light Commission, they to build a shed and work room sufficient to meet the necessary needs of the city.  
Committee also reported they had notified Mr R. P. Williams of the New Bern Street Railway and Electric Co., to remove their lamps, wire and other stuff now stored by city, answer to notice was read, and was ordered filed.  
Upon motion Commissioner's report was received and ordered placed upon record.

Mr Eby of the Elm City Lumber Co., appeared before the Board and asked that permission be granted them to construct a gutter across South Front street at their mill for the purpose of conveying slabs across the street and stated that no obstruction would be put in the street or side-walk in support of the gutter and sufficiently high to be out of the way of any passing under same. Upon motion the request was granted. The Company giving \$500.00 bond to protect any damage that might occur by said gutter.  
Upon motion a committee was appointed to draft suitable resolutions relative to the death of Alderman Rose. The following committee was appointed J. B. Dawson, L. S. Wood and S. H. Lane.  
Upon motion it was ordered that two policemen be designated at a time to do sanitary duty.  
Upon motion the following ordinance was adopted.  
By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern, be it ordained:  
That in pursuance of the act of the General Assembly of North Carolina of the session of 1903, "entitled an act to amend chapter 83, private law of 1899," a Sanitary District composed of that square surrounded by Pollock St., Middle St., South Front St. and Craven St. be made and that in the said district the above mentioned act shall take effect at once upon 5 days advertisement.  
That each separate tenement—or occupied lot in the said district shall be connected with the city sewers. That every ural or water closet used in said district shall be connected with the said sewer under the rules in force by the Water & Light Commission established by said act.  
That provision shall be made upon all premises for emptying all waste water (except rain fall) and all other waste matter proper for sewerage pipes into the said sewers.  
That a copy of this ordinance shall be served upon each tenant and owner of property in the district by the City Chief of Police and a written return of such service filed with the Tax Collector.  
That if within ten days of such notice served on the owner of any lot or house in said district such connections as by this ordinance and the act of Assembly aforesaid shall not have been made, the Water and Light Commission shall notify the Mayor by writing, and it shall then be the duty of the Mayor to arrange with the said Water & Light Commission to forthwith make the said connections as by the said act is directed and authorized, and to report the same to the next meeting of this Board.  
That all owners of property to said district shall make proper and safe arrangements for a water supply to flush the said sewers and to keep the same in first class sanitary condition; and a failure so to do shall entail a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars, and each week thereafter shall be a separate offense.  
Upon motion Board took recess to next week Friday, 10th, and adjourned to next business pertaining to revising City Ordinances. No other business will be transacted at said meeting.
