Improvement Co.—Cadets' Open.

RALPHON, June 20.—A charter is granted the Carolina Land and Improvement Co., of Beaufort, Washington county, capital one hundred thousand dollars. Wiley O. Rodman and others are stockholders.

To Colonize Negroes in New England.

Norfolk Virginian Pilot-19th.

A northern man is building a brand new scheme for the relief of the colored race and his idea is to colonize 500,000 negroes in New England. Any negro in the south can go north if he wants to and the agent of the association, which wishes to take the colored men north, arrived in the yesterday. He is J. W. Mullaney, who came in from Boston and who was in consultation with many colored men during the day. Mr. Mullaney is so stated, going through the entire south and he said he was hopeful of securing several thousand at the start. The best of everything is promised the colored men in the north.

Mr. Mullaney stated that he was the agent for the American Colonization society, whose primary object was "for the betterment of the colored race."

"I've read around Boston," said Mr. Mullaney, "there are already several hundred colored men who have been there about six months. We have fulfilled every promise made and they are apparently satisfied."

"Some have begun to learn trades and many are doing manual labor. The laborer is being paid at the rate of \$1.50 a day, and as their expenses are not very heavy they may be able to save something out of their earnings. We have also secured many house servants, who are paid better wages than they are in the south. We had some little trouble at the start in getting the colored people to come to the north."

"Many of them had been taken in by scheming men, who alleged they were representing certain organizations. These they had been approached by men who offered them a 'veritable Garden of Eden' at Liberia. The experience of many in Liberia was calculated to make them suspicious."

The American Colonization society

is not the only organization which proposes to colonize the negroes in the north. Rev. J. Henry Dacey, pastor of the New Model Olive Baptist church, Cambridge, Mass., is at the head of a similar movement. Dr. Dacey's society proposes to colonize 500,000 negroes in Boston, Mr. Mullaney, who was here yesterday, stated that he knew Dr. Dacey and said that the reverend gentleman was firm in the belief that people to New England were of the opinion that the only royal road to liberty for the negro is an exodus. Rev. Dr. Dacey is quoted as saying that New England can take care of 5,000,000 negroes.

75 PER CENT INCREASE

In Deposits of New Bern's Banks in Five Years.

By referring to the files of the Journal we find the deposits of the banks of this city on May 5th, 1898 as follows:

The statements of the city banks just published, of June 9th, 1903, show a remarkable increase as follows:

This shows an increase of the bank deposits in New Bern in the past five years to be nearly 75 per cent, a splendid showing, especially creditable to the management of the local banks, as well as showing the prosperity of the city.
