COUNTY BRIDGE QUESTION

Considered by Mass Meeting of Citizens of Pollockville Township.

At a meeting of the citizens of Pollockville Township, to consider the action of the Board of Commissioners in regard to building a bridge at Pollockville across Trent river.

John Pearce was called to the chair and H. C. Foscoe requested to act as Secretary.

After a full discussion of the matter, the following resolutions were adopted.

Resolved 1st, That the order passed by the Commissioners asking for bids to build a wooden bridge across Trent river at Pollockville, be considered impracticable and unbusiness like considering the poor quality of material commensurate, and the great cost of getting good heart lumber, and the best of wood bridges will only last 10 or 15 years, then the same trouble and cost will have to be incurred again, while a good steel bridge will last 50 years. The steel bridge will cost \$3,500, 2 per cent a year will pay repairs. \$70 for 50 years will be \$3,500. The wooden bridge will cost \$2,000, and it will take 4 bridges to last 50 years. \$7,000 with 10 per cent per year for repairs \$180 for 50 years, will be \$8,000, add to this cost \$ 7,500 Then we will have for four wooden bridges, and repairs 9,000 \$ 18,000

The steel bridge and repairs \$ 3,500 \$ 8,000 \$ 7,500

A saving to the county in 50 years of \$ 9,000

Resolved 2nd, That we deplore the feeling existing in the upper part of the county in business and in politics, against the lower part, a disposition that seems to us, has developed into a prejudice. We would say to our fellow citizens, who this attitude is that this is unseemly and unpatriotic, and we beg them to rise above this petty feeling, and agree to our rights, we see nothing more; Pollockville and White Oak Township pay about two thirds the taxes of the county, and by right we are entitled to two thirds the disbursements; but we are not kicking for helping pay your expenses, we are willing to help pay every necessary demand on our county, and we only ask the same liberal spirit of you. For 12 or 15 years we have been asking for a steel bridge at Pollockville. We have shown the necessity and economy of this kind of a bridge at this point, but you have persistently opposed it.

Resolved 3rd, That we can but compliment J. H. Bell, one of the Commissioners, but we condemn this action of the Board, and we pray them, to rescind the order, and with an eye single to the business interest of the county, let a contract for a steel bridge, or let the matter rest for the present.

Resolved 4th, That these proceedings be sent the New Bern Journal, with request to publish.
