### VOICE OF THE PEOPLE.

Iron Bridge at Pollockville.

Cypress Creek, Jones County, N. C., June 24th, 1903.

EDITOR NEW BERN JOURNAL:—I am certainly glad to see that the citizens of Pollockville Township are making an effort to save Jones County from another blunder, and at the same time save money for the tax payers all over the County. It needs no argument to prove to the ordinary mind that with the scarcity of good heart lumber, and the price that one has to pay for it, that a steel bridge on a good permanent foundation across the Trent river at Pollockville, is economy to the tax payers, and the rank and file of the right thinking people of Jones county are in favor of it. It is true we may have a few old fossils, who cannot see beyond their nose, (and they generally have small noses) that would oppose any improvement. These fellows are back numbers, and out of date; there are doubtless some who favor the iron bridge but are afraid to advocate it, for fear it might not be popular among the voters.

These latter are looking for office, but I want to say to all such that the ordinary voter, knows that it is economy to him as a tax payer to have a steel bridge across the Trent river at Pollockville. It is good for the soul to meet a fellow citizen who has convictions of his own, and the courage to assert them. We must remember that Pollockville Township took the position some thirty years ago, that it was right to prohibit the sale of intoxicating drink—to close up the bar room, and they have had remarkable prosperity for this period. While I think our lands are better in this part of the county, yet Pollockville Township pays more taxes; their property is valued higher, do more voting, and are more fortunate generally than we are; they have a rail road which kind providence seems to have given them, this road is a large tax payer, it did not cost the county any thing, and the whole county gets the benefit of the taxes it pays. The tax payers of Jones county are entitled to the steel bridge across the Trent river at Pollockville, and I believe the commissioners will give it to them.

Before closing I want to say that our friends in Pollockville Township are mistaken if they think that we are prejudiced against them.

### A POLITICAL SLAP?

New Bern and Wilmington Left Without a Deputy U. S. Marshal.

The shirking of Charles M. Babbitt, as deputy United States Marshal of this district, embracing New Bern—and Wilmington, has provoked some heavy thinking among Republicans in this city.

### Think Before You Drink.

Suppose, just as you were about to lift a glass of your favorite beverage to your lips, somebody should exclaim: "Stop!"

Wouldn't seem very presumptuous, wouldn't it?

It wouldn't be, though, if it were a note of warning concerning your health.
