### Close of Christian Scientists' Communion Work.

Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. was held the closing service of the Christian Scientists for this annual gathering. It was the Testimonial service such as is held in every town and city where Christian Science is established. On this occasion the great hall was crowded beyond its seating capacity (2,000), hundreds stood and 2,000 had to hold an overflow meeting in the adjoining exhibition hall, in order to give all a chance to even hear the services.  
Although the time limit was made three minutes, but few comparatively could tell their "good" news even then; often five or six would be on the floor at the same time, so, as the time drew near its close, Prof. Horing (who, by the way is a son of Dr. Constantine Horing, one of the founders of Homeopathy in this country) asked all who had been healed to rise if they wished to bear their testimony to the efficacy of Christian Science; and it was impressive to see the thousands who promptly availed themselves of the opportunity to express their joy in their Lord and His deliverance.  
The diseases healed were numerous—consumption, Bright's disease, Asiatic cholera, diphtheria, drink habit, rattlesnake bite, agoutism; and one, a former theological student, gave a most beautiful tribute to his present understanding of life and the teachings of Jesus as explained in Christian Science, and to the love—so tender, so forgiving—as lived by Mrs. Eddy that all may enjoy the fruit of her labors. It was noticeable how many men testified to victory, not only over sickness, but over business discouragements and difficulties, as well as over gambling, drinking, the use of tobacco and other bad habits.  
Sydney, Australia; Manchester, England; Manila, P. I.; Berlin, Germany; and other foreign countries were represented, as was every State in the Union.  
Judge Hanna, former Editor of the Christian Science Journal, testified to the wonderful courtesy of the Press towards his subject and himself during his extensive lecture tour; and, speaking for the Cause and for every Scientist, he made acknowledgment of the public fair spirit in every way.  
The Press of Boston has been most generous, as have all over the country, for every one seems to wish to give the news as it really is.  
The trip to Pleasant View at Concord, N. H., the home of Mrs. Eddy, was the crowning event of this week. The great crowd, estimated at 10,000 people, was the best handled mass of people the writer ever beheld. The hospitality of the Concord people was marvelous; homes were opened, the Club-house was given over entirely to the Scientists, tables and lunch supplied, and one member served the great company with lemonade sent from his own house. All this evidenced with what loving regard Mrs. Eddy is held in her home town. Never did she look stronger or happier than as she greeted this multitude of happy, upturned faces, and her words were of sweetest counsel and constant pointing of way to God. They were as follows:  
"Beloved Brethren, welcome home; to your home—in my heart. Welcome to Pleasant View, but not varying views. I would present a gift to you today. Only that this gift is already yours. God hath given it to all mankind. It is his coin, his currency, it hath his image and superscription. This gift is a passage of scriptures. It is my sacred motto—and reads: "Trust in the Lord, and do good; so shall thou dwell in the land, and verily thou shalt be fed. Delight thyself also in the Lord, and he shall give thee the desire of thine heart. Command thy way unto the Lord; trust also in him, and he shall bring forth thy righteousness as the light, and thy judgment as the noonday."  
"Beloved, some of you have come long distances to kneel with us in sacred silence, in blessed communion, unity of faith, understanding, prayer and praise—and to return in joy, bearing your aboves with you. In parting I repeat to those dear members of my church, Trust in truth, and have no other trusts. Today is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah: "And the ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness and sorrow and sighing shall flee away."  
The business meeting on Tuesday was full of interest to the Scientists, showing that Christian Science has come to stay, and its followers from all over the world were joyful in the report of growth. The membership of the Mother Church is 27,700 in December 1902. It was 2,000 in the addition this year was 2,000, an increase of 91 over any previous year. Membership of the branch churches is 21,200; number of branch churches is 125. A gain of 22 churches year.  
Death row in the mother church" was 2,225 against 2,225 last year; the death row of Boston in 1902 being 2,275.  
New Zeving O'Connell, of Concord, N. H. always was a member of the church. A short time ago he was in the city and had been in the Boston Scientific Society.

### RALEIGH.

#### Important Meeting Corporation Commission—Death of Mr. Latta. Work on Haywood Case.

RALEIGH, July 7.—Many persons were in attendance at today's session at the Corporation Commission, where important cases were taken up. The first of these was the Durham Union Depot case in which general attorney W. A. Henderson and F. H. Busbes represented the Southern Railway, and General Counsel Legh B. Watts and J. M. Barr, the Seaboard Air Line. In the case of the exceptions filed by the principal railways in the State to the order fixing time limit for the delivery of freight, also demurrage rules etc., as made by the Corporation Commission, this being known as the Charlotte case, Percy Albright and other officials of various railways appear on their behalf, while Heriot Clarkon of Charlotte represented the petitioners.  
The death of Mr. C. H. Latta, president of the Raleigh Hoosery Company, occurred at his home here late last night from a second stroke of paralysis. He was struck by a street car in New York almost exactly a year ago, and was for sometime paralyzed. His second attack yesterday resulted fatally in about ten hours.  
The number of inmates at the Soldiers Home here is now 92. The extension of the dining room, in order to seat 125, has been completed.  
The State Hospital for the Insane here now has water from the city water works, and this proves convenient and excellent in every respect.  
A great deal of work is being done by the attorneys on both sides in the Ernest Haywood case. The trial of which will begin next Monday. Such hard work by both sides has never before been done in this county, it is said.

#### RAILROADS DENY

### The Right of Legislature to Compel Them to Build Union Depots.

RALEIGH, July 7.—At today's session of the Corporation Commission, the matter of building a union depot at Durham was taken up.  
The railways denied the right of the legislature to order the building of union depots by corporations, and contended that the body could neither cause the building of such depots itself, nor could it place the power in the hands of the Corporation Commission to do so.  
GOVERNMENT BOATS ARRIVE.  
River and Harbor Improvement Boats Here and Will Commence Dredging the Neuse Soon.  
The steamer Gen. Thom and dredge Albemarle, of the United States River and Harbor Improvement Service, arrived from Columbia, on the Beaufort-nong river Monday where they have been since December.  
The Gen. Thom is on the ship railway at Meadows yard where it is undergoing repairs, and the Albemarle is of Union Point.  
The work of dredging the lower end of Ransom channel in Neuse river will begin soon. It will connect with the Trent river channel. Capt D. L. Roberts has charge of the work.
