

KILLED BY FALLING CHIMNEY.

Strange fate of a little colored child, a very peculiar accident happened yesterday morning when the chimney of the four year old son of Edie Bryan, colored, was instantly killed.

The mother lives at No. 31 Gaston street and the next house is only close to her yard that there is not more than 18 inches between the tops and houses.

No one lives in the house No 31 Gaston street, but it had been observed for three months that the chimney, built entirely outside of the house had settled and was leaning outward, and of late the woman had become alarmed that the chimney should fall and do some harm.

The little boy was in his mother's yard at play when without any warning the chimney collapsed, a part of it falling in the boy's yard. A brick struck the child on the head and before the mother could reach him he was dead.

The mother heard the crash and hearing that the chimney had fallen called to the boy but she received no answer and when she went to look for the child he was lying with an ugly wound on his head.

The chimney had long been exposed to the weather and the mortar had mostly broken out of the bricks and the chimney was in a very bad condition.

Coroner Degeid investigated the circumstances of the accident and decided that an inquest was not necessary.

A. & M. College Catalogue.

The catalogue of the State Agricultural and Mechanical College shows 803 students in attendance; being 488 from North Carolina, 3 from Virginia, 4 from South Carolina, 1 from Maryland, 4 from Florida, 1 from Delaware, 1 from New Hampshire, 2 from Washington, D. C., and 1 from San Domingo. There are 121 students in Agriculture, 60 electrical engineering, 64 mechanical engineering, 118 mechanical arts, 96 civil engineering, 43 textile engineering, 18 industrial chemistry. There are 30 officers and teachers. Tuition \$40 a year, board \$5 a month, 100 scholarships. Anyone can get a catalogue by addressing A. & M. College, Raleigh, N. C.
