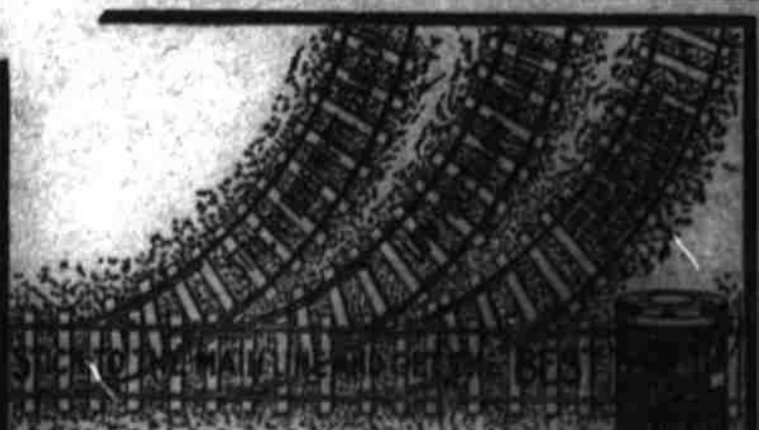

### LOOKS LIKE MURDER.

Colored Man Found in Neuse River Near Ft. Barnwell.

Sunday, two colored men both aged about 31 years, living at Vanceboro, and employed by Mr. W. O. White, were sent to Ft. Barnwell.

Today the body of one of the men, named Oliver Richardson, was found in the Neuse river at Ft. Barnwell. It was thought at first that Richardson had met with an accident and was drowned, but upon examination no water was found in the body, and one eye had been gouged and a bruise was on the face.

It was also reported that the two men had quarreled which led to the suspicion of murder, and Coroner Duguid was sent for to investigate.

Dr. Duguid left here at 8 p. m. last night and will reach Ft. Barnwell about midnight and hold the inquest.

### A Fine Fig Crop.

There were 14 varieties well matured and full. The weather has been unfavorable for them but notwithstanding that, Mr. McDaniel says the crop is large and quality good.

### Death of Mrs. J. B. Mason.

Mrs. J. B. Mason, of Durham, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Dr. Clark Dumas at Beaufort, Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock. She had been ill for some days with a fever and on Saturday had a chill; early Sunday morning she had a second chill which she was unable to survive.

Mrs. Mason was a lady of wide acquaintance both in Durham and in Beaufort and was very highly esteemed. Her loss will be sincerely mourned by a large circle of friends.

The remains were taken to her late home in Durham Sunday evening.

### Banana Dealers Fear For Crop

Norfolk Virginia Pilot August 16th. There has been some concern among Norfolk banana dealers regarding the reports of the great storm damage to plantations of Jamaica, which country furnishes a large percentage of that fruit shipped to the United States. Although the loss is not so extensive as was first reported, at the same time wholesale dealers are free to admit that there is a strong probability of the importation falling off to a very appreciable degree as a result of the recent hurricane. The receipts have been very heavy at the leading ports of entry in the past two weeks, so there is a sufficient supply on hand to offset the Jamaica losses for several days at least. After that, it is believed that the prices will advance.

However great the Jamaica damage, there is no danger of a banana famine for the reason that American importers have other sources from which to draw supplies.

### SUPPOSED GAMBLING

Den Raided. Police Raid a Den And Find Incriminating Evidence.

Police, Lupton, Bowden and Bryson raided a place known as the "Klondyke" Saturday night and captured three of the inmates. They took some dice and money which was on the table to use as evidence that there was gambling being conducted there.

The raid occurred between 11 and 12 o'clock. There were about a dozen inmates of the place which is located on Queen street and is said to be notorious for gambling.

The room is in the second story of the building. The ground floor is used as a grocery.

Officer Lupton led the party to the place and upon the second knock gained admission to the room. The door was opened and there was a general scrambling.

Some hid under the tables and lounge and others jumped out the windows. Officer Bowden caught one of the fellows by the feet just as he was jumping out, but as he had a very poor grip on the fellow he had to let go of him. But the man left one of his shoes in the officers possession. It is said that the man was Jim Paton and that he was badly injured by his fall having sustained a broken arm.

The three boys who were captured were Will Sprull, Mat White and Webster Oram, all colored. They were taken before Magistrate Frank Patterson yesterday afternoon for their trial. R. W. Williamson appeared as Sprull's attorney and J. E. O'Hara was White's lawyer.

The evidence at the trial developed that the building is owned by Miserva Mumford who was terribly shocked to think that a building owned by her should be under suspicion as a place for gamblers.

Oleoro Hill who has the grocery is said to have charge of the gambling outfit and allows it to be practiced in his room. William Schenck is also said to be associated with him. Jim Satterthwaite, Hill's clerk, was held as accessory.

Hill cannot be found. Two of the boys were sent to jail in default of bond to await trial in the Superior court, another gave bond and Satterthwaite was discharged.
