Prolific Corn Stalk. The Journal has added another curio to its "private museum." This time it is a freak stalk of corn.

The stalk before cutting was twelve feet high and very stout, in size almost a wonder, but the curious feature is the unusual prolificness of the plant.

Two well developed ears had been plucked from the stalk, leaving four shoots, which might have matured in good time. A few days after the two ears were plucked two shoots each appeared in their places, making in all ten ears to the one stalk.

Fair Warning. Any that have not paid their Dog Tax or any other tax due the city as imposed by the City Aldermen, are hereby warned that if such tax is not paid on or before Sept. 1st 1908, warrants will be issued against them, and will be dealt with as the law prescribes. Dog Law—Any person having or owning a dog who shall fail to return for taxation or to pay the tax shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not more than five dollars or imprisoned two days, dog declared a nuisance and destroyed. Any person carrying on or exercising any trade or profession taxed according to law, by the Board of Aldermen without first obtaining a license, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not more than fifty dollars or imprisoned thirty days.
