## MONSTER MEETING.

### Demonstration Against the Tobacco Trust.

Merchants and Farmers Combine and Adopt Resolutions to Fight Tobacco Monopoly.

The various prices that are prevailing on tobacco has stirred the farmers and business men of Craven and adjacent counties to action. The matter has become a serious question, they feel, when a small body of men shall control prices on staple articles and rule that the highest price paid shall be lower than it costs to produce that staple. That is the case with the present tobacco question.

There was an enormous crowd at the court house yesterday which was composed of farmers and merchants. It was called at the instance of the local Merchants and Business Men's Association for the purpose of discussing the matter with the farmers. The farmers were present in large numbers. A delegation from Newport and the section south of Craven county came up on the train yesterday morning. Two cars being required to carry all the passengers. Great many were present from Jones and Onslow counties.

The meeting was called to order by President John Dunn of the New Bern Retail Grocers Association at 12 o'clock. Mr. Dunn was made permanent chairman, James W. Waters, secretary and W. S. Colton assistant secretary. After the statement by the president of the purpose of the meeting the following committee to draft resolutions was announced: J. B. Harvey, J. H. Igoek, S. S. Waters, John F. F. Wetherington, Alfred Gaskin, David McIntosh, David McCain, J. Z. Boyd, J. A. Thomas, Joel Kinsey, A. B. Dawson, and J. H. Stevenson.

President Dunn said he wanted the meeting to be an informal meeting and invited a general discussion.

Col. Cunningham, promoter of the movement against the trust was expected to be present to address the meeting but failed to appear.

Mr. W. C. Brewer made a few remarks. He confessed that he didn't know what could be done that would relieve the situation. All that he knew was that the price paid for tobacco was less than the cost of raising the crop. He was there to learn and to concur in the meetings deliberation.

In the absence of the speaker Mr. D. L. Ward was asked to address the meeting. He made a fine speech in which he espoused combination and organized opposition to the trust. In reply to the question "what are you going to do about it?" he said the farmer could take his tobacco home and look it up and rot. The farmer does not have to plant tobacco he can rely on other things for subsistence. He told the farmers to be firm, to stand together and though the fight might be long and hard but they would eventually win for it was a righteous fight.

Mr. Daniel Lane then made a short speech in which he advised strong national effort.

The following resolutions which were adopted by the Merchants Association Friday evening were read by Mr. John O. Whitey.

## Reliance Easy Winner.

Splendid Sailing Wind and Good Weather For First Race. Second Race Special to Journal.

New York, Aug. 22.—The first of the races is definitely in favor of the American yacht, by over two minutes including the time allowance.

The wind early blew about ten miles an hour from southwest. The weather was clear, sea smooth.

As there was no race on Thursday, the same course was sailed, fifteen miles to leeward and return, the breeze freshening throughout until it reached about twenty miles.

The Shamrock crossed the starting line first, at 11:45:17, the Reliance at 11:45:51.

To the fifteen mile mark the Reliance out pointed and out sailed the English boat, securing a lead of about four minutes, the time at mark being Reliance 1:55, 14, Shamrock 1:58, 30. The Shamrock having trouble in getting her balloon jib set after crossing the mark.

Both yachts raced home at terrific speed, with wind on quarter and blowing about twenty mile rate, the Reliance crossing the line at 3:17:45 p. m. Shamrock 3:24:40 p. m., the American boat winning by 8 minutes and 55 seconds.

The second race will be sailed Tuesday, the course being triangular, ten miles to the leg, thirty miles in all.

Official time Start-Shamrock 11:45, 17, Reliance 11, 40, 24. Outer Mark, Reliance 1:55, 14, Shamrock 1:58, 30. Finish, Reliance 3:17, 45, Shamrock 3:26, 40. Stipulated time Reliance 3:25, 24. Shamrock 3:29, 34. Reliance won by 7 minutes, corrected time.
