### VOICE OF THE PEOPLE.

#### Too Much Trust.

Mr. Horton: I was at the meeting of the farmers and merchants at the Court House on Saturday last. I was very much impressed with the large number present and with the earnestness that was displayed. It seems that there is practically only one buyer of tobacco in North Carolina, and they do not themselves having no regard for any one; there was a time when there were numerous buyers of tobacco, but the American Tobacco Company has either bought them all up or put them out of business. So there is only one party to buy, it will soon be the case with all of your products unless you do something to checkmate them.

Now the remedy, and the only remedy is organization, that is what they have done, that is what you must do, but people say farmers will not pull together, well you must pull together or be crushed. You can meet and pass resolutions, but that does not amount to anything, in fact the big combinations want you to do this, they look upon it as a safety valve. You gentlemen are now confronted with the Tobacco Trust, the Meat Trust, the Petroleum Trust, the Cotton Trust, the Cotton Combination, the Lumber Trust and a host of others, now you must have a combine, a trust, or a trust.

Nearly everything you buy in Trust made, you pay what they ask, you sell for what they may give you. A great financier once said he held the purse strings of a nation he could dictate its policy. But say that if he held the man behind the plow, he would soon hold the purse strings.

There was a resolution passed at a Saturday meeting asking that a meeting be held in each township on Saturday next. Now hold that meeting, do not pass any resolutions, but appoint a committee of three from each township to meet with a like committee of merchants at New Bern on the second Saturday in September, then and there formulate a plan of campaign, map out the lines on which you wish to go and stick to it, then you will soon find that you have a hand in making the value of your own products.

### REMARKABLE SHOWING

Made by the Famous Bicycle in This City.

Yesterday at Mr. L. M. Edgerton's bicycle store, George O. Warner was demonstrating the difference between a bicycle and the bicycle, and the tests showed up some very remarkable results. The bicycle manufacturers have had 1,500 posted for five years, which will be given to the one who can show their crank hanger does not warp 1/16 of an inch in pressure on the handle, and the tests given today showed very clearly how this saving is made. He had suspended in a frame a bicycle crank hanger, and attached to it were three scales; when 100 pounds was exerted on the center of the right pedal it showed 40 pounds strain on the left crank bearing, and 100 pounds strain on the frame. He then removed the bicycle hanger and applied a regular bicycle hanger to the same scales, and they showed 100 pounds strain on the left bearing and 100 pounds strain on the bicycle frame, a big increase as compared with the bicycle.

He also showed by another scale the amount of strain that was on the different bicycle chains and frames, and the bicycle required 100 pounds less than any bicycle tested.

The bicycle is noted for its easy running qualities, and it will climb a hill with less exertion on the part of the rider than any other bicycle.

It should require very little thinking on the part of the bicycle rider to decide which is the easiest riding bicycle.

### Bell Frog Culture Falls.

The raising of bullfrogs for the market by C. W. Keller, near Kinston, Pa. has proved a failure. The frogs refuse to live in captivity.

The frog farm gave promise of being a paying venture until the croakers died off so fast that the original stock was all gone. Their rapid death appeared to be the result of an epidemic, but they really died of their stifle disease.

The scholarship provides one hundred dollars in cash and rail road fare to and from Nashville. The school begins in October.

It is said that only seven applicants for this scholarship out of twenty-five in this State were successful in passing the examination.

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### RALEIGH.

Crop Report Encouraging. Canals Assessed For Taxes. Odd Fellows Increase.

Raleigh Aug. 24.—The crop reports for August are now coming in from the thousands of more correspondents of the state agricultural department. Interest is always felt in the publication of these reports, particularly at this time when the condition of the crops is at a rather critical stage. The crop conditions are just now particularly good.

Tomorrow the corporation commission will complete its statement showing the value of railway property in the various towns and counties. It is said that the value of such property in some counties is greater than the value of the real estate therein. This will show what the great increase in railway assessments has done.

The corporation commission assesses the canals. The State used to own several of these but has now no stock in any. The last one sold was the Clinchfoot and Harlowe, the name of which is now the New Bern and Beaufort.

Some of the State officials are making quite a protest against the delay in getting printing done. It was stated at the office of the State Superintendent of public instruction that a list of the county Superintendents, which was sent to the printer about five weeks ago, has not yet been printed, though there are many inquiries for it.

Yesterday afternoon in the yards of the freight station of the Southern railway here a negro boy about ten years old, Driver, by name, was killed. He attempted to cross a track in front of a through freight train, but caught his foot in the frog of a switch, and was run over, both legs being cut off.

Rapid work is now being done in the completion of the interior of the Pullen Memorial building at the Agricultural and Mechanical College. The massive brick pillars of the imposing portico are finished. This building will give an auditorium, dining hall and lecture room which have been of late so greatly needed.

Grand Secretary Woodell of the Odd Fellows left today for Fayetteville. He says the growth of the order in this State and United States continues to be remarkable, and this year will be even greater than in 1900. In the latter year the net gain in the country was about 65,000, but this year it is expected to be between 75,000 and 100,000. Application have been received for new lodges at Silgo, Curdick county and at Franklinton.

Grand Secretary Woodell says the membership of the order in this State now exceeds 9000. Secretary of State Bryan Grimes, who is also much interested in the fight against the tobacco trust, is preparing a Statement which will show the people of the State the condition of affairs. He is pleased at the interest taken by the various organizations of farmers, and known very well that the latter cannot succeed unless their is entire unanimity of action among them.

They were warned that the next time they were arrested they would go into the cells for a time.

### Fernandez to be Released.

United States Commissioner Charles B. Hill has received a communication from District Attorney Skinner, saying that the bond of Fernandez, the Portuguese who is now in jail at New Bern on a charge of smuggling, may be reduced from \$500 to \$100.

A gentleman living in this vicinity has signified his willingness to sign the bond and Fernandez will probably be released in a day or two.

### COMPROMISING WITH THE MOB

From "With the Procession," in the September Everybody's.

The success of Senator Foster, of Louisiana, in stopping an expected lynching of a negro by appearing on the scene with two judges, addressing an "impassioned appeal" to Judge Lynch's jury, and promising that the criminal should be tried by a jury to be drawn the next morning, speaks well for his courage and his eloquence, but is not convincing, perhaps. A criminal is entitled to be tried by due process of law. To hurry that process, to make it an undue process for the sake of appeasing a riotous assembly, to stand, hat in hand, and say, "Good gentlemen don't lynch the man; the courts will 'railroad' him to the gallows, if you will kindly wait"—this is almost making the mob a part of the machinery of justice. It is compromising with disorder.

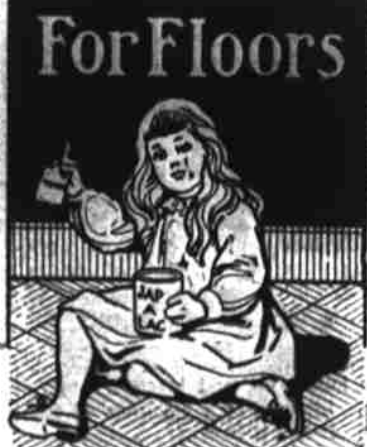
