LABOR DAY.

Governor Aycock issued his official proclamation setting Monday September 27th as the date for North Carolina's Labor Day and a general holiday.
Proclamation.—Whereas, The Legislature of North Carolina has appointed the first Monday in September of each year Labor Day and a general holiday, and the said first Monday in September being the same day as that by the statute of the United States and the statutes of the various States in the Union.
Now, therefore, I Charles B. Aycock, Governor of the State of North Carolina, in recognition of said legislative acts and with a view to the continuance and strengthening of the good will which exists between all the people of this State, do request all of the citizens of North Carolina to observe Monday, September 27, 1903, as a holiday, and that in every way possible, employers cooperate with employees in worthy recognition of the dignity of labor and in the becoming observance of Labor Day. Let there be as far as possible cessation of labor throughout the State. I request that all places of business of whatever character where labor is employed shall be closed to the end that those employed may enjoy a day of rest and thanksgiving. The day ought to be observed by all people in expression of appreciation of those who toil, for upon them rests the progress, prosperity, success and happiness of the State. Let harmony exist between all employers and employees. Let us foster and strengthen that confidence between those who employ labor and those who work which is essential to the peace of the State and the best interests of all the people.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be affixed. This the 27th day of August, A. D. 1903, and in the 19th year of our independence.

RALEIGH.

Corporations Slow in Sending Reports to State Auditor.

Land Company Chartered Lacy to Deliver Memorial Address. Applicants Examination For Attorneys. Audubon Society Doing Good.

Raleigh, August 28.—The State today chartered the Heights Land Co. of Goldsboro, with a capital stock of \$50,000, the stockholders being Senator F. M. Simmons, Congressman E. W. Fox and William T. Dorth of Goldsboro.
State Treasurer Lacy leaves tomorrow for Portsmouth, where on Sunday afternoon he will deliver a memorial address on the late P. M. Arthur, the head of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The address will be before the Brotherhood of Portsmouth and vicinity and at their special invitation.
It is learned at the office of the State Auditor that some of the corporations are still slow in sending in their reports. They claim that this is due to the slowness of the assessors and boards equalization, and that they cannot obtain from the latter the valuation of their real and personal property in order to deduct the amount of this from the capital stock. The delay is giving the auditor a good deal of trouble.
Fifteen sheriffs have yet failed to make total settlement of their State taxes. All of these except two or three have made partial payments.
The Supreme Court will on Monday examine applicants for license as attorneys.
Up to this date thirty-eight of these have registered. On Tuesday the first district appeals will be called. There are no State cases on the docket from this district.

It is expected that the attendance at the Agricultural and Mechanical College at the opening, and in fact during all of the coming term will break the record.
There are now seven branches of the North Carolina Audubon society. The one here is actively at work against violators of the game laws. Today a warrant was issued for a man who a few days ago killed a wild turkey. The warrant is issued upon affidavit of the county game warden.
The State superintendent has issued a complete list of the county superintended care of education and also those of city and towns graded schools. Of the latter there are now no less than 83. The graded school system is certainly growing in North Carolina.

RUNAWAY TRAIN

On Blades Lumber Company's Road at Goose Creek.
While carrying a train load of logs on the Blades Lumber Company's Pamlico road to Goose Creek pier, on Friday the train men lost control of the train, the result being that the engine dashed against and overthrew the bumpers at the end of the pier, the engine and one carload going into the river.
There is quite a down grade on the road some hundreds of yards before the pier is reached, and the train men miscalculated the weight and force of the train, which got beyond their control, the logs on the cars also preventing the free use of the brakes.
Except the engine and one car there was no loss, the trainmen escaping injury by jumping off before the cars reached the pier.
