DEATH OF CAPT. J. B. DIXON.

Fall's Overboard From His Tug Boat and Drowns.

Capt. J. B. Dixon, familiarly known among his friends as "Brake," was drowned yesterday afternoon by falling overboard from W. B. Ellis' tug Mattarack, of which he is captain. The accident occurred about three o'clock, off Whitty's wharf on House river near Union Point. He was drowned in about nine feet of water.

The real cause of the accident is not known but the facts that immediately preceded it are these. The tug and the steamer Ocracoke were going up the river—the tug for a boat and the steamer for freight. The Ocracoke passed the tug on the port or shore side and gave a signal, Dixon who was at the wheel answered; a second signal was sounded and was answered. All whistles and signals have their significance to boat men and it is said that Mr. Dixon's signal was given wrong. Realizing that he had made a mistake and fearing the derision which he knew would come from the crew of the Ocracoke, he stepped outside the wheelhouse to avoid being seen by any of the steamer's crew and in some way he made a false step, slipped or stumbled and went overboard, falling on the starboard side of the boat. The only witness to this accident was a boy, Ed Parsons.

The Ocracoke had passed the tug a considerable distance when the captain hollered back to Ellis Williams, the engineer, "your captain has gone overboard, he is in the water on the starboard side." Simultaneous with this the Parsons boy gave the alarm but the first indication that engineer Williams had that anything was wrong was when he heard the cry from the steamer.

Mr. Dixon was seen swimming in the water. Alvin Willis of Smyrna, who was a short distance away in a sail boat got in his skiff which was attached to the larger boat and attempted to reach Dixon before he sank. It was easier for him to row to the place than to change his boat about. Dixon was seen to come to the surface three or four times but when Willis reached the place he had sunk not to rise again.

A number of boats immediately pulled out into the stream to help recover the body. Two divers, Frank Sulner and Cleveland Canon rendered their services also. Drag lines were set and every device at hand was brought into use.

The body was recovered at 5:30 by means of a hook and line. The men in the boat into which the body was taken were Messrs Ellis Williams, A. E. Pittman and Will Baxter.

The remains were placed in a wagon and taken to the family home on Metcalf street.

Mr. Dixon was well and favorably known in the city and was very popular among his associates. He had been on the police force and was a capable and brave officer. While on duty as special officer last spring he was shot in the leg during the fracas in which a negro was killed on an excursion train on the Atlantic Coast Line train. He leaves a wife and four children.

The funeral will be held Friday evening at four o'clock, at Centenary Church. The services will be conducted by the lodge of Royal Arcanum of which he was a member.

Exciting Runaway.

A most exciting and dangerous runaway occurred in the city yesterday evening about 5 o'clock, but happily no particular harm resulted.

Miss Mita Simpson, a young lady who lives over in Bridgetown drove over to town in a buggy to meet a friend. As her horse was crossing at the junction of Craven and Craven streets, he became frightened and dashed madly away, going first up Johnson to Queen street, and on up above the Five Points, where being well winded by his furious sprint he was easily stopped by a colored man.

The lady with great presence of mind kept her seat, making no outcry, and while her strength was not sufficient to arrest the progress of the animal, she did succeed in keeping him in the road, her calmness, no doubt averting a fatal accident.

The cause of the horse's flight was a great lot of trash and plunder piled up along the street. How long it had been there no one can tell.

Sweden After Rockfall.

Stockholm, September 8.—The newspapers are raving against John D. Rockefeller for making their beautiful Rogers House, an island at the entrance of Stockholm, "a stock in the nostrils of the capital and world of visitors."

Mr. Rockefeller secured this beautiful and picturesque island three years ago and turned it into a capital depot, where beautiful villas were erected and with feet. Stockholm has come to be considered that the island is a nuisance on account of the ugly things which stand about the bay, and the newspapers declared that Rockefeller was a pest.

German Temperance Bill.

Berlin, Sept. 8.—The Government will introduce in the next Reichstag a bill designed to promote temperance. Among the provisions saloon keepers are required to sell non-intoxicants, such as lemonade, milk, coffee and tea, and cold food.

Credit is forbidden, thus abolishing the system extensively used in the country districts and among students, and the number of barmaids is limited.

Elizabeth City Goes Dry.

Elizabeth City, Sept. 8.—After a stubbornly contested election held here today, Elizabeth City went dry by 170 votes. The women prayed in the church as while the men worked at the polls. The church bells were rung every half-hour to remind the voters that the blessings of God was being invoked on the battle against the sale of whiskey.

New Queen of the Seas.

New York, Sept. 8.—A new trans-Atlantic record was established today with the coming into port of the Hamburg-American liner Deutschland. The Deutschland now holds both the eastward and westward records, having beaten by her the latest performance the record held by the Kronprinz Wilhelm of 8 days 11 hours and 57 minutes for the westward crossing.

The Deutschland's time was 5 days 11 hours and 54 minutes, or 3 minutes better than the record. The westward time is taken from the Cherbourg break-water and the eastward time from Plymouth. The Deutschland's record to Plymouth is 5 days 7 hours and 38 minutes. The next best record eastward is held by the Kronprinz Wilhelm, her time being 5 days 8 hours and 18 minutes.
