price drops fifteen to twenty dollars per
bale, this is very disappointing and dis-
couraging to the farmer.

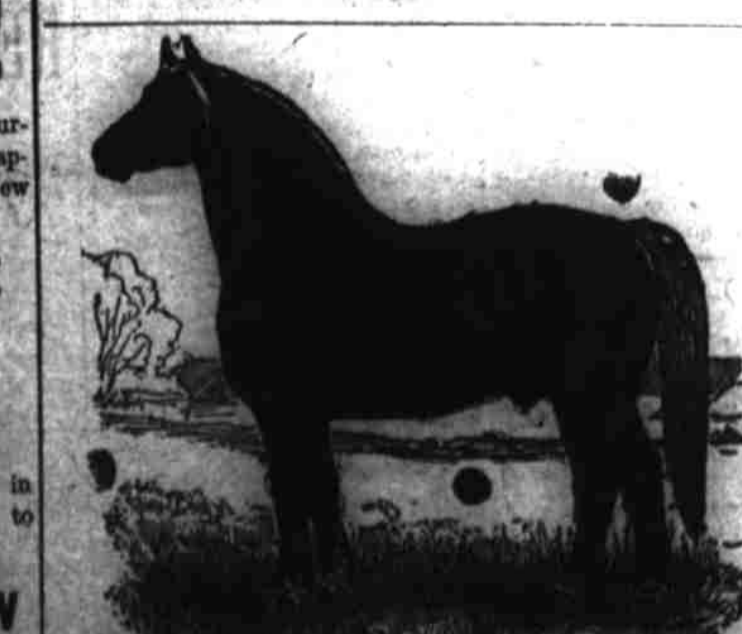
