RALEIGH.

Sheriffs Make Full Settlement. Sta. & Veterinarian Think Health of Animals All Right.

Raleigh, Sept. 18.—Yesterday it was stated in the office of the State Treasurer that all the sheriffs had made full settlement of their State taxes, with the exception of the defaulting of Wayne county. Today it was stated in the office of the State Auditor that eight sheriffs have not yet made full settlement.

Dr. Tait Butler, State Veterinarian, says that matters in his department are in very good shape; that there is relatively little disease among horses and cattle. There is always a little Texas or splenic fever among cattle in North Carolina.

The April bulletin of the agricultural department has just been made and now, the May bulletin is being sent out, having been just received from the public printer, who also sends the June bulletin which will be next mailed.

Today a petition from the citizens of Lincolnton was filed with the corporation commission, asking for a Union Passenger station. A petition was also filed by the citizens of Charlotte, making the same request. Notices will be served upon the railroads and they will be given time to answer if they desire to do so. It may be that they will agree to build the stations without further proceedings on the part of the commission.

A TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE.

The British Steamer Mexicana Sinks With Her Crew.

Of the pitiful stories relating to a storm at sea the story of the Mexicana which was wrecked off the Florida coast in Tuesday's storm is the worst. The boat went down with all but seven of its crew. They report a fearful experience in combating with the waves which finally overcame the boat.

The boat which was a British steamer was sailing from Tampico to Vera Cruz with petroleum oil in bulk. When about two days out she was struck by a hurricane and in a few hours was rendered helpless and later was completely capsized and went down.

One man was picked up off Hatteras and taken to Norfolk. It was thought there that he was the sole survivor of the wreck but a special from New York says that six others were found clinging to pieces of wreckage.

One of the rescued men said in an interview: "We were on the bridge with the officers and jumped overboard just as the steamer went down. Just before I heard two pistol shots. I think some of the officers shot themselves, preferring that death to drowning."

Another one said that hundreds of gallons of oil were poured over the side of the ship in a vain attempt to quiet the waves.

Big Warehouse Fire.

The fire at Elizabeth City Thursday night which was mentioned in yesterday's Journal in which the steamer Alma was reported burned was more extensive than was first reported. Besides the loss of the steamer Alma, the N. & S. freight depot a large quantity of freight was consumed. The loss is estimated at \$100,000 and may reach more. A deck hand on the Alma is said to be missing.
The fire originated in the oil room of the steamer Alma or in the depot freight room. Several people were hurt by the explosion of oil and two kegs of powder. The fire narrowly escaped getting to a half ton of powder stored in the warehouse.
