Proposition from McIntosh & Williams to repair the present boiler was discussed, upon motion was not accepted.

Proposition from Hyman Supply Co. and Gaskill Hardware Co. to furnish new boiler and necessary attachments was considered and upon motion the contract was awarded to Gaskill Hardware Co. theirs being the lowest price.

RALEIGH.

State Treasurer Predicts That State Will Soon Be Out of Debt. Delay in Issuing New Bonds to Guard Labor Organizations Both to Give Information.

Raleigh, Sept. 22.—The representative of the American Tobacco Company says that owing to the diversification of crops in this section the tobacco growers are able to hold their test, but he does not think those east of here are so fortunate as they depended upon tobacco and cotton and did not grow so much grain or other supplies.

During this month about 15 new rural free delivery mail routes have been put in operation in the State.

The hospital for the insane here has secured some additional lands and now has 170 acres. It's farm was never in finer condition and this may be also said of all the grounds. It is one of the greatest of Raleigh's many attractions.

The town and the grass are said to be very like those in an English park.

State Treasurer Lacy says he thinks that if the State does not get entirely out of debt this year it will certainly do so next year. Speaking of the settlements of taxes by sheriffs this year, he said they had been made very well and that so far he had to bring no suits, though of course he had to make threats.

Today a big banner advertising the State fair in October was displayed on the street here. Every preparation is being made to have the fair a record breaker. The entries of live stock and of farm products are larger than ever before and there will be some new features.

It was expected that the Krig Magazine rifle would be issued to the National Guard of the State about the first of the month. They were received in August. For some reason there has been a delay in making the issue but it is estimated that they will be sent out this week.

The last report of the State labor commissioner contained return regarding all labor organizations in North Carolina. The report for this year will contain some of these. It is hard to get information from them, particularly from the new organizations, as they will not as a rule answer questions on blanks, but have to be personally seen. The new ones greatly dislike to give out information.

The election here today on the issue of bonds in aid of the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound railway was a quiet one. The voting was all one way, in favor of the bonds.

Speaking about the Atlantic and North-Carolina railway and of his very positive determination to lease it, Governor Aycock said today that the road is now earning over 2 per cent in excess of operating expenses.
