That Erwin Mill Number Two at Duke.

New Railroad Survey. Local Tax School Districts. Masonic Fair Preparations. Great Corn Yield. Treasurer Lacy Member Red Cross Society.

Raleigh, Sept. 25.—It is learned that the survey of the Raleigh & Albemarle Sound railway will begin October 1st at Wilson and will be conducted both ways towards Raleigh and towards Washington. The work is to be pushed as rapidly as possible, and as stated it is the purpose to have the road completed in 18 months from that date. The only heavy work on the line will be from Raleigh towards Wilson, a distance of say 10 miles. By the way State Treasurer Lacy an ex-engineer has consented to run the first locomotive over the road, taking the first excursion from Raleigh to Washington.

State Auditor Dixon has returned from Greensboro where he went to look after the assessment of the Southern Trust and Loan Company.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is advised that in Duplin county two local tax school districts have been formed and that in three districts money has been raised by subscription for lengthening the school terms.

Today the work of building the booths for the Masonic Temple Fair here in October began. The ardent rooms on the lower floor of the agricultural department will be made very handsome and gay. The fair will be a great event the number of contributions of all kinds is surprisingly large.

To show how good the crops in this section it may be stated that 57 acres of corn on the city farm will yield at least 900 barrels.

It seems to be a current opinion now that the Atlantic Coast Line will extend its road from Springhope to Raleigh. Number of years ago work was pushed as far as Springhope and then was stopped by an agreement with the Seaboard Air Line.

Professor Devilla of the chair of foot ball at the Agricultural and Mechanical College here has arrived and taken active charge of his work. He is a splendid football and baseball player and ready for work in the big leagues.

The great slip of the Erwin No. 2 cotton mill at Duke on the Cape Fear and Northern railway, which was seen for the first time yesterday by the Raleigh citizens was a great surprise to all of them. The development there is simply astonishing. The location is very good on a high plateau, only a quarter of mile away from the city of 100 feet on one side and 25 feet on the other. It is in this 25,000 spindle and 1,000 room mill is, it is only one of what will be a group of mills there—space for which has been carefully preserved, and the investment of Mr. Duke at that point will run up into the millions. The railway will be extended, probably at an early date from Apex, its present western terminus to Durham, and this will put this great mill in touch with Erwin Mill No. 1 at Durham, which is a very large one. W. A. Erwin named the town Duke, in honor of the president of the mill and the railway and then Mr. Duke gave the name to the mill in honor of Secretary Erwin. The mill town of Duke is to be made the model mill town of North Carolina, with every element of a comfortable home, with modern lines. It is another instance of North Carolina's wonderful development. Much money will be spent to develop the immense electric power which the falls of the Cape Fear River there will furnish.

State Treasurer Lacy has been made member of the Finance committee of the Red Cross Society, for North Carolina, the appointment being made by Mrs. Clara Barton, the head of the organization.

Flour Mills Shut Down. KINCHELOPS, N. C., Sept. 24.—Fourteen of the 12 flour mills belonging to the Pillsbury-Washburn, the Washburn-Crosby and the Commercial Milling Companies have been shut down by the strike begun last night.

The remaining three, which belong to the Washburn-Crosby company, will be closed as soon as the wheat in the fields runs out. It was part of the plan of the strikers to leave every mill in good condition, with the wheat all run out. They are satisfied with the outcome of the operation in the mills still running. There is no sign that the four mills belonging to independent companies will be disturbed for the present, although they have not granted the demands of the strikers.

Hard Coal Mines Ordered Closed.

WILKESBORO, Pa., Sept. 24.—The orders for a restriction of the anthracite coal output has affected nearly all the collieries in this region. Today orders were issued by the Lehigh Valley Coal company to close down its twenty collieries on Saturday and Monday. The Susquehanna Coal company will place its sixteen collieries idle on Friday and Saturday. The Delaware and Hudson company has posted notices at its eight collieries in this vicinity that the mines would be worked but five hours a day until further orders. It is said that the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western company will place its collieries on three quarters time. The Reading Coal company will also restrict the output by shutting down some of its collieries for repairs.

Over 48,000,000 tons of coal have been mined since January 1, which is several million tons more than was ever produced for a like period in the history of the mining industry. The present glut in the market and the efforts to prevent a break in prices is the cause of the restriction.
