Teachers for the Philippines.

The Civil Service Commission has just received a call from the Philippine Government for 120 male teachers, with salaries as follows: \$20 to \$21.50 to \$25.00 and \$25 to \$300 per annum. It is desired to secure these teachers without unnecessary delay, and an examination will be held on October 15-25 in various cities.

For application blanks and further information concerning the scope of the examination, transportation conditions of employment, etc., applicants should apply to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or to the secretary of the civil service board at any post-office where letter carrier service has been established. Persons who are unable to file their formal applications in order to receive examination blanks to the examination will be admitted to take the examination, if they will apply to the Commission by letter to arrange to take the examination at a later date, and to pay examination papers and stamps for their examination.
