A NEW INDUSTRY.

The Manufacture of Arms and Pins for
Telephone, Telegraph and Trolley
Lines Pioneered in the
City.

The following local appeared in the "Electrical World" and "Engineer," a weekly magazine published in the city of New York and probably the best and most circulated magazine of its kind in the world. The articles concern two large industries in which New Bern is interested. They are as follows:

"The Eastern Arm and Pin Co. of New Bern, N. C. is now equipping another plant, especially manufacture large, special arms for street railway and power line work. Its business in this line both for domestic and foreign consumption has grown to such large proportions that it has been obliged to separate it from its general cross arm business."

The above company have factory plants at York and Dover, N. C., and their products are in great demand in the northern and western states. Their offices are in the Hughes building over Bradham's drug store and the company was recently incorporated with an authorized capital of \$100,000 and the officers are: J. O. Hinton, President; E. T. Baily, Vice-President; D. W. Baily, Secretary and Treasurer. Mr. D. W. Baily resides in this city and has charge of the Company's offices.

The other article was in reference to the Virginia Locust Pin Co., who have their offices in connection with the Eastern Arm & Pin Company and their factories are at Sperryville, Wards Gap, Betty Baker, Meadows of Dan, in Virginia and North Carolina factories at Mt. Airy, Abner, Elkin with offices at Elkin, N. C. and New Bern. Their Tennessee factory and offices are at Mountain City. The article was as follows:

"The Virginia Locust Pin Company with headquarters at New Bern, N. C. is now operating large plants in three States, Virginia, North Carolina, and Tennessee. The product of its factories in northern Virginia is used for making prompt deliveries north and east, that in Tennessee for prompt deliveries in the west and that in North Carolina for Southern distribution. It has great advantages in the way of freight."

The officers of this company are, D. W. Baily, Pres., J. O. Hinton, Sec., and Robert S. Jones, Treas. Their North Carolina headquarters which are located in this city are under the supervision of the President of the Co., Mr. D. W. Baily.

THE WINDS BLEW AND

Rain descended. The Storm of Past Two
Days One of Most Terrific
Violence.

Aside from causing great inconvenience to pedestrians and a general damp, uncomfortable time the storm which has raged for the past 48 hours has created havoc on the waters adjacent to New Bern. Reports from all along the coast give accounts of wrecks and serious damage to shipping and a considerable loss of life.

The News and the Trent have been unusually turbulent and craft on them have suffered more than for several years. One or two small boats were blown ashore near Fort Point but they succeeded in getting off without any damage.

Friday the sloop, Reed Benedict, which is the property of Mr. Ormer turned turtle below Johnson's Point. The crew escaped but the cargo, valued at \$60 was an entire loss. The boat was bound for Bayboro. It was in charge of Mr. Cameron Parsons. It is thought the boat will be restored.

The schooner James Rumley had a rough time of it Friday near Cherry Point. She dragged her anchor from the north to the south side of the river, the crew being powerless to stop her. She capsized and is thought to be a total wreck. She was the property of Maurice Sullivan, of this city.

The sharpie Bath started from below Broad Creek to sail for New Bern Friday but the crew finding it impossible to make any headway against the wind she dropped her anchor and later found good harbor, but not before she had dragged her anchor a considerable distance.

Mr. G. N. Lyles' gasoline launch was the only boat to reach this port Friday. But for the fact that there was a double crew on the launch it would have been able to make the trip. She suffered a broken rudder but one was improvised and she made port safely.

The only boats reaching the city yesterday were the steamer Oceanic and the tug William B. Bladen.

Further official weather reports of the storm along the coast state that the total rainfall in New York for the past 36 hours was 10.02 inches--an enormous amount.
