Property Owners Make Protest.

TO JOURNAL.—The following petition to the Board of Aldermen has been signed by all the owners of property on both sides of South Front street along the line of the proposed railroad track, except the Gas Co. The proposed railroad being for the sole benefit and convenience of the Elm City Lumber Co., and that company is the only one asking for it.

To the Hon. Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern.

The undersigned citizens and tax payers of said city would make known to your honorable body that they are greatly opposed to the proposition to permit a railroad track to be laid in and upon South Front street, from the A. & N. C. R. R. Co.'s track, present right of way, westward up said street.

Your attention is called to the fact that this is one of the narrow streets and when it shall be filled in and graded, to meet the requirements of a railroad connecting at Hancock street with the main track of the A. & N. C. R. R., the street would be practically raised for a distance as to its use by the public for the ordinary purposes of a street, and the available passageway upon said street would be much less than at present, and the thoroughfare would be practically much narrower.

A rail road up said street is bound to result in great damage to the property situated thereon, and would be of no benefit except to one corporation.

There are stores on said street which depend for a great part of their business upon the trade of persons coming in from the country in their own carts and other vehicles.

A railroad on said street would render it an unsafe thoroughfare of locality for horses and other draft animals from the country, unaccompanied in the night and under no locomotive, and care in motion consequently the country people would avoid the street, and there is business thereon, would lose their customers.

A LARGE BEAR SHOT.

The Carcass of the Animal on Exhibition Yesterday.

Mr. D. F. Whitford of Zions brought the carcass of a bear to the Oaks Market yesterday which he shot on his place Monday night. The bear was caught in a trap which was attached to a pole but that did not seem to interfere with his movements very much. In his frantic efforts to liberate himself he had broken the pole, leaped about 20 feet of fence and had created general havoc all around him.

The trap was placed near a corn field as bears have caused the farmers in that neighborhood a lot of trouble on account of their destruction of the corn fields. This one is believed to be the worst of the bunch and they are quite numerous.

The animal was the largest that has been taken in that neighborhood for several years. He weighed 235 pounds and measured nearly five feet from tip to tip. He was a vicious fellow and would have put up a strong fight with any one if he had been given an opportunity.

Mr. Whitford found the bear in the trap and quickly dispatched him having his gun ready for the occasion. It is a fine specimen and when the hide is cured it will make an attractive rag or ornament.

"REFORM THAT REFORMS"

What is Being Done for the Health of School Children.

During Health Commissioner Lederer's administration in New York all school children have been examined by competent physicians once a week; four hundred cases have been treated daily; during the past year half a million children have been treated for a single contagious disease of the eye—trachoma—which neglected results often in blindness.

This of course means that over and over again the same child has been caught by the contagion of this disorder. After all this, one is not surprised to learn that during Dr. Lederer's administration the rate of mortality from consumption has been reduced 40 per cent, and that the rate of mortality from diphtheria has been reduced from 37 per cent, to less than 11 per cent, or that in spite of the fact that there has been an epidemic of small-pox and dysentery, the percentage of the death rate in the city is the lowest record. Surely this is an achievement worth while.—Alfred Hodder in Everybody's Magazine for November.
