FINANCIAL OUTLOOK.

For State Next Year Reported Good.

State Charters Granted. State Educational Loss. Frost Injuries Cotton, Bookers Washington to Visit Colored Fair at Bal. 1898.

Raleigh, October 27.—A charter is granted to the Panigo and Bellayton Real Estate and Investment Company of Panigo, capital stock \$12,000, John H. Small, C. P. Acock, and others being stockholders; also a charter to the Maccles Lumber Co., of Robeson county, capital stock \$25,000, T. G. McAdoo, and others stockholders.

State Auditor Dixon says the State's financial outlook is very good for next year. The State will pay its running expenses, the balance of debt, not provided for by the bond issue, and will have a pretty good balance this year, it seems.

It takes a great burden from the shoulders of the Treasurer and Auditor when they realize that there will be money in the treasury and that the borrowing business is at an end.

The Supreme Court called the docket of appeals from the ninth district this morning.

The State Board of Education today made another loan this time of \$9,000 in aid of school houses in 11 counties. This loan represents the building fund of \$37,000, the counties will add \$18,000. Of the amount loaned \$47,750 goes to eleven districts in Mecklenburg county. The total amount so far lent from the educational fund for the building and improvement of public school houses is \$70,000.

State Treasurer Levy has been in poor health for the past five weeks, having suffered much from asthma, but today said that he felt better than in a long while.

Revenue Collector Dunbar has returned from Baltimore where he was two weeks with his youngest son, who was successfully operated upon.

At the term of the United States District Court, soon to be held here, there are no cases of special importance, but there are even more than usual number of post office cases of various kinds.

There was a sharp frost this morning, which had considerable effect upon cotton.

Governor Aycock left on the morning train on his way to Hartsville, S. C. where he will speak tomorrow at the celebration of the discontinuance of the high school.

The negroes here are manifesting great interest in the visit of Booker Washington to the colored State Fair, who is to speak here next Friday.

In the Supreme Court today there was argument in a case brought to test the constitutionality of the law barring osteopaths from practicing medicine in North Carolina.
