President Will Designate Nov. 26 as Thanksgiving Day.

Washington, Oct. 29.—President Roosevelt will issue his Thanksgiving Day proclamation on Saturday next, October 31. He will designate Thursday, November 26th, as the day of Thanksgiving.

Big Fruit and Truck Combine.

Norfolk, Oct. 28.—A special to The Virginia-Pilot from Laurel, Delaware, says: "A million dollar combination was formed here today after a two weeks session of the leading fruit and truck carriers of the United States. All the parties involved claim they have combined simply to effect a saving in securing raw material and in distributing their products. They claim they will thus save the farmers thousands of dollars annually. Railways will be built and a line of steamers, tugs and barges will be run through North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland and Delaware. The principal factories are the Dales Marvel and Lewton Ward & Co., of Laurel, Del.; Wycombe Lumber Company, of North Carolina; Schofield Barnes & Company, of Pocomoke, Md.; Robinson & Company, of Sharptown, Md.; Crane Hinson & Vallant, of Chestertown, Md.; Harvey Marvel, nephew of the late Governor Marvel."

Cotton Growth Checked By Frosts.

RALEIGH, Oct. 30.—Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson, says the severe frosts this week have ended all growth of cotton, but that he cannot as yet judge what amount of damage these early frosts have done. The frosts this year is weeks earlier than it was last year, when November was the warmest since the weather bureau station was established at Raleigh.
