THE NEWS IN A NUTSHELL.

New York State gave a majority of nearly 200,000 in favor of the proposition that the State shall spend \$101,000,000 for improving its canals.

At Iona Island, N. Y., six men were killed and ten injured by an explosion at the United States naval arsenal one of the largest magazines in the United States.

Engaged over a runaway hog Calvin E. Wade, a New York State farmer, shot his wife, who laughed at him; then he committed suicide.

The death of William Shaw, who was picked up on the streets and locked up in a police station cell at Norfolk as a "drunk" was caused by being run over by a fire department truck.

All negroes have been notified to leave Morgan Park, a Chicago suburb.

Six men were killed in Kentucky during the election.

Lieut. A. M. Beecher was killed by a fall on the battleship Maine.

The State of Panama, Colombia, last night declared her independence, and the long expected revolution began. Trouble also occurred at Colon. The United States has dispatched warships and marines to the scene.

Complaint against anthracite coal-carrying railroads alleging discriminating rates against Maryland and other sections was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The State Department is unofficially advised that Japan and Russia have reached an agreement concerning Manchuria and Korea.

PENITENTIARY SHOWING

Appears Good One Financially. Crops Good On State Farm, Republican Newspaper at Raleigh.

Raleigh, Nov. 5.—In the course of an interview with officials of the penitentiary it is learned that the number of convicts at present is 900. Of these 881 are on the great State farm, known as "Caledonia" on the Roanoke river. On this farm there are this year 2,000 acres in corn, 1,400 in cotton and 400 in peanuts. The cotton crop will be somewhat short but yet a thousand bales will be made where 1,800 were expected. The other crops are very good. In the course of the questions asked the official it was learned that the financial standing of the penitentiary is extremely good, that all debts are paid, including the bill for fertilizers, and that there is \$30,000 to the credit of the penitentiary. As yet nothing of the present crop has been sold. Of the accounts due none are bad ones.

The brick making at the prison here this year has paid very well indeed, about two and a half millions of brick having been turned out. The sales have been very satisfactory. One million brick were sold to Mr. Ashley Home at O'ayton, for an oil mill there. The demand for convict labor is very great, but no convicts are now available, nor will any be so until after the crop at the State farm has been gathered.

The Goldsboro Lumber Company now has fifty convicts and the contract for these had been renewed. Over 30 years ago the penitentiary bought 67 acres of land a mile south of Raleigh, at the point where the North Carolina railway crosses Walnut Creek, and took the clay from this land for use in making brick. Now the sale of the land is ordered, as the brick clay is obtained from lands the penitentiary bought recently on the line of the Raleigh and Cape Fear railway.

During the winter the Republicans will establish a weekly paper here, the funds have been secured. They talk as if it will later be made a daily, that is for next year's campaign, in which some of their leaders profess to believe they see some opportunity or success.

ARAPAHOE.

Nov. 5.—Our people are now busy sowing their sweet potatoes, the crop is very short this season in our community.

There was a fighting case brought up before Mr. Joseph M. Reel of Arapahoe last Monday evening, a colored man by the name of Hollowell whipped a boy for which he was fined one penny and cost. The affair seemed to begin in play.

Mr. J. L. McCotter who has for some time been clerking for Mr. J. M. Reel of Arapahoe has gone in to the drumming business, he was in Arapahoe Monday evening representing W. F. Hesberg Co. of Richmond, Va. He is in the shoe and leather business.

Mr. Charles Miller of Bayboro is in Arapahoe collecting tax both for this year and back taxes. He says he has the back tax very near all collected. Mr. Miller makes a very good deputy.

Mr. Mamie Rawls, with her husband Mr. George Rawls, moved to Bayboro about one year ago, was brought home a corpse yesterday evening and buried in the family grave yard on Wilkeson Point road. We sympathize with Mr. Rawls and the little girl she leaves to mourn their loss. She was a kind mother and affectionate wife. Messrs. Richard and George Ellis of New Bern, brothers of the deceased, came down to see the last remains of their sister put away.
